SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN, NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any area numbered section of Dominion Land in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, excepting 8 and 20, not served, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 100 acres, more or less.

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land to be taken is situated, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent for the district in which the land is situated, receive authority for some one to make entry for him.

HOMESTEAD DUTIES: A settler who has been granted an entry for a homestead is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under the following plan: (1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of any person who is to make a homestead entry under the provisions of this Act, resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such person as a homestead, the requirements of this Act to reside upon a homestead shall be satisfied by the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the person residing with him.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon a farm in the vicinity of the land he has homesteaded, the requirements of this Act to reside upon a homestead shall be satisfied by the settler himself.

APPLICATION FOR PATENT should be made at the end of three years, before the Local Agent, Sub-Agent or the Homestead Inspector.

Before making application for patent the settler must, at least 30 days before, be writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention to do so.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING REGULATIONS.

Coal-Land may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal and \$20 for anthracite. Not more than 320 acres can be acquired by one individual or company.

Locality at the rate of ten cents per acre on the output of 100,000 lbs. of coal.

Miner's certificate is granted upon payment in advance of \$7.50 per annum for an individual, and \$10 for a company, for each year in operation within one season from the date of the issue of the certificate.
