

MIKADO OF JAPAN.

Tokie, Nov. 3 .- To-day is the birth day of the mikado, and it is safe to say that the anniversary of November 3rd, 1852, on which day Emperor Mutsushito was born, was never pelebrat generally as this year. Chrysanthe mums ruled the day, The sixteen-petaled chrysanthemum being the crest of the emperor, the flower stands in high esteem in Japan and is extensively used on the occasion of the emperor's birthday, to add beauty to the artistic decorations in which the Japanese excel.

The victorious ending of the but a few weeks ago, the warlike . thusiasm so recently rekindled by the triumphant return of the Japanes fleet and the presence in the city of large body of soldiers greatly cont buted to give to the celebration day a decidedly martial color. As usual the morning was devot

to a review of the troops on yama Palace grounds. The streets through which the troops marched were gorgeously decorated with flags, banners and other artistic decorations and were lined with enormous crowds. which cheered the brave soldiers with enthusiastic "Banzais" The cheers of the crowd increased to a thundering roar, when the mikado, dressed military uniform, and surrounded by a brilliant staff, approached. Thous ands of people surrounded the Aoya ma Palace to obtain a glimpse of the emperor and his suite and to see th troops, marching past the imperial stand in review ...

One of the most attractive features of the celebration was the display of chrysanthemums in all parts of the city. Flowers of every hue and shad the height of a few inches that of a tall man, were displayed every street and transformed the city in a big flower garden. In the evening Baron Komura, the minister of foreign affairs, will give a reception at the Imperial Hotel, to which three thousand persons have been invited
