



Longmore's tables, the most reliable statistics of war, based on the records of battles for two hundred years, show that there has rarely been a conflict of any great duration in which at least four men have not perished from disease for every one from bullets. In the Russo-Turkish war, 80,000 men died from disease and 20,000 from wounds. In the Crimean campaign, in six months, the allied forces lost 50,000 soldiers from disease and only 2,000 from casualties In the French campaign in Madagas car, in 1894, of the 14,000 men sent to the front twenty-nine were killed in action and 7,000 from disease, most of which was preventable. 
