COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What Is Going On In the Business World—The Markets.

The futures in Canada this week were 27 last year same week, 30. Grand trunk Railway earnings Nov. 1st to 7th, \$810,349; increase, \$75,000.

A Detroit firm are erecting a smelter at Argentine, about a mile and a half from Hudsonbury.

An Ottawa despatch says that for the quarter ending October 31st, \$384,803 was paid out in bounties for iron and steel.

Experts, we are told, calculate that Irish bogs are capable of turning out 500,000,000 tons of fuel per year for a thousand years.

A rich strike is reported in the long tunnel on the Rambler, Cariboo mine at Stauder, and the company's stock has risen from 12 1/2 to 30 cents a share.

Madame A. Mann will go into mining extensively, on the north shore of Georgian Bay. The mines are known as the Moses Mountain iron deposits.

W. F. Burland, representing Montreal and New York capital, has completed the purchase of 20,000 acres of coal lands on Queen Charlotte Island from a syndicate for \$750,000.

The Tomiakaming and Hudson Bay Mining company is this week paying the subscription of 20 per cent, on the new value of its stock, or in other words, \$2 per share.

A Hat, in the centre of the Canadian Northwest, is a natural gas city. Gas can be found at depths varying from 600 to 1,000 feet. The town, cross the gas system and sells gas to domestic customers at 17 1/2 cents per thousand.

Exports of cheese from Montreal during the week ending November 5th, totalled 174,818 boxes, against 72,146 last year, and 106,872 in 1908. Since May 1st, 1,957,208 boxes have been shipped, against 1,916,817 for the same time last year and 2,240,612 two years ago.

THE CAPITAL TIDINGS

TO ASK PARLIAMENT FOR A DIVORCE.

Action Taken by a Montrealese—The Latest Appointments Made by the Federal Cabinet.

Ottawa, Nov. 11.—William Thomas Saunders, of Montreal, is applying for divorce from his wife, Marie Louise Russell Morton, now at Albany, N.Y., on the ground of adultery.

The following appointments are gazetted:

Robert Nickerson, of Sag Harbor, Nova Scotia, to be wharfinger; Capt. James Wilson, of Bronte, to be wharfinger; Anthony Lemieux, of L'Islet, Quebec, to be wharfinger at L'Islet in the room and stead of Octave Morin, deceased; David Langard, of Tenny Cape, in Hants county, N.S., to be harbor master of Port of Tenny Cape; Edward Cunningham, alias Coude, of Cap au Corbeau, in the province of Quebec, to be wharfinger; Frank Morissette, of Grand Mere, Quebec, to be deputy collector of inland revenue (class B.), at Grand Mere, aforesaid, in the inland revenue division of Three Rivers; Luther E. Foley, of the city of London, Ont., to be chief inspector of gas and electric light in the London district.

A LIBERAL SWEEP.

Probably Only Two Conservatives Elected.

Calgary, Nov. 10.—As the smoke of yesterday's battle clears away, and the final returns from the outlying polls in various constituencies are received, the decisiveness of the conservative defeat becomes more apparent. The party as a political factor in provincial affairs has been annihilated, the rout being almost without a parallel in Canadian provincial politics. It is doubtful if even two conservatives have been returned. Rosebud seems to be the only sure thing for the opposition, with High River a possible second seat. Even Mr. Sherman, the conservative candidate in Pincher Creek, whose election was conceded last night, has been beaten by the final returns which give Marcellus (liberal), a substantial majority of 120. Leacombe, which has been in doubt, has gone liberal, as expected. Mr. Puffer, having 52 majority, will increase his lead. In Leduc, Mr. Telford has 200 majority, and his opponent will lose his deposit. Griesbach shares the same fate in Edmonton.

Bank is probably the most creditable victory, where Mr. Fisher triumphed over all the influences of the C.P.R. and the dead end of the conservatives, and won by 110 votes. This is the first time Bank ever gave a liberal majority.

The conservatives will make a strong attempt to hold Calgary. In Alberta there is no voters' list or registration, the franchise being exercised by avocates who will take the oath. Scrutinizers may be unpermitted to declare, in such cases the ballot is sealed up and not counted until the vote proves his qualification in court. There are 350 such ballots, and on these the hopes of the conservatives are pinned. Liberals, however, expect to get an even break.

Some of the majorities are: Strathcona, Rutherford, 300; Edmonton, Cross, 550; Cardston, Woolf, 175; Banff, Fisher, 139; Red Deer, Moore, 29; Medicine Hat, Finlay, 59; Calgary, Cushing, 25; Gleichen, C. Stuart, 46, with one poll to hear from; Pincher Creek, Marcellus, 120; Sturgeon, Boyle, about 300; Peace River, Dubuc, probably elected by acclamation; Lethbridge, Deveyer, 157; two polls to hear from; Rosebud, Clarke, small majority; Innisfail, Simpson, small majority; Vermilion, McCauley, 153; Leduc, Telford, 200.

JOSEPHINE CARR.

The Fourteen-Year Old Girl Reaches Prison.

Josephine Carr, the young girl of fourteen years, sentenced to seven years in the penitentiary for kidnapping and causing the death of a child arrived from Toronto, to-day, in a charge of officials. She dined at a local hotel—her last meal in freedom for seven long years. She is a pretty fair-haired child, and wore a red dress and hat, and a black coat. All through the meal, and when the back drove her of she showed no more concern than a child going with its parents for a trip. A morbidly curious crowd gathered around the hotel, and "look per in." As she was leaving the dinner table, she "pocketed" two royals snow apples. She had nothing to say for herself.

Meetings have been held at London, Hamilton, and Ottawa, and four times in Toronto. Addresses will be delivered next week by Hon. W. J. Hanna, Mayor Urquhart, Professor Goldwin Smith, Rev. Robert Hall, J. C. Kelso, Professor Wrong, Dr. Smith, Dr. Helen McMurray, Warden Gilmour, Adam Brown, Hamilton Cassels, Rev. Dr. Perry, and E. J. Hearn.

THE CARGO SOLD.

The schooner Highland Beauty, which sank with a cargo of peas at Cape Vincent, Thursday night, has been purchased by C. Cole and J. Kilborne. Captain Donnelly, who went over to Cape Vincent yesterday, expected the cargo, and made the sale of it and the owner of the vessel, Captain Lobb, acted as the representative. The deck is badly burned, the rest of the schooner being under water. Little can be determined. The cargo will be lightered and then it is thought the vessel will float itself.

AFTER FORTY-FIVE YEARS.

Among those removed from the list of county magistrates is William Robinson, ex-M.P.P., Edw. J. B. Pense, M.P.P., and John McKelvey. William Robinson was appointed forty-five years ago and had served hundreds of times and had collected a fee. BLAMES STUDENTS

FOR PART TAKEN IN THE MONTREAL ROWS.

The Paper Thinks Liberty Should Be Upheld by Students—Russia is Seeking That Now—A Coming Debate.

Montreal, Nov. 11.—Le Canada, to-day, gives a scathing reply to the demand for apology which the Laval students emphasized yesterday, by burning bulletin boards and throwing eggs. While recognizing that not all students took part, and the most of the disorder, in the Mage lecture on Christ in the twentieth century, was caused by outsiders, Le Canada says too many students were there. It regards them that liberty of thought and liberty of speech are guaranteed and asks whether these young men want to establish here, the system now being overturned by blood in Russia. It denounces the attacks of late on the Salvation Army and Mage lectures. While the lectures are contrary to their views and their religious ideals it is very easy to stay at home as in any case the lecturer will not make any headway. The paper concludes with saying that the students are more to blame than the exhibition of intolerance than the ignorant unreasoning mob.

McGill and Toronto University debaters have selected the following subjects for three submitted: "Resolved that the decision of the House of Lords in Scottish church cases is unjustifiable." Messrs R. L. Calder and G. V. Cousins, Toronto University, have elected to debate the negative view of the question.

MARRIAGE OF GEORGE IV.

He Was Legally Wedded to Mrs. Fitzherbert.

London, Nov. 11.—By permission of King Edward, the Daily Chronicle asserts, a package of papers consigned to the care of Coutts' bank, by Mrs. Fitzherbert, (Marie Anne Smyth), under the stipulation that it was not to be opened for a long period has now after seventy years been opened and proved to contain the marriage certificate and other indispensible proofs that George IV. was actually married to Mrs. Fitzherbert.

Mrs. Fitzherbert became the wife of the Prince of Wales, afterwards George IV., in December, 1785. The marriage of the prince was invalid under English law, though it was sanctioned by the Roman Catholic church, of which Mrs. Fitzherbert was a member. It was expected that the papers in Coutts' bank would settle a question which has agitated the British public for over a century as to whether there was issue from the marriage, but there is nothing in the foregoing despatch to indicate that the question has been solved. It has long been reported that there actually was a male child, and that this child emigrated to the United States and settled in Washington, where he died some years ago, after living quietly but in good circumstances.

LONG-LOST WATCH FOUND.

Concealed by Burglars in Old Building.

Niagara Falls, Ont., Nov. 11.—In June, 1902, several residences in this city, including that of J. T. Henderson, were ransacked by a gang of burglars—Scott, Mouchal, Doyle and Smith. All four were captured and sent to Kingston penitentiary for three years. Two of them were captured on a Toronto boat. At Niagara-on-the-Lake, on the way to Niagara jail, they broke away and hid in the old steel works buildings, where afterwards they were retaken. While they were in the buildings one of them had a valuable gold watch stolen from Mr. Henderson. Major Clement is now tearing down the old steel works, and in the ruins Ballif Chapman found the long lost watch. He brought it to this city. Henderson identified it and suitably rewarded the finder.

The gang was released from Kingston a few months ago. Scott has since been under arrest here and in Michigan for vagrancy and carrying concealed weapons. Mouchal is serving fourteen years in Ohio for safe-blowing. Smith and Doyle have disappeared.
