**DEMAND FOR IT MALICIOUSLY DISTORTED.**

**Martial Law Proclaimed—Extraordinary Measures—Directed Against Possible Inclination of Prussia to Intervene—Fulfilment of Mutineers.**

St. Petersburg, Nov. 13.—Intrigues which in the case of Finland, all but prevented a peaceful issue of the struggle for freedom, are having a counterpart in Poland, whose demand for autonomy is being maliciously distorted into a separatist movement. Martial law has been proclaimed throughout Poland. Extraordinary measures now being taken are directed as much against a possible inclination on the part of Prussia to intervene as against the possible insurrection of the Kronstadt mutineers. A majority will be sent on a foreign cruise.

**A Mysterious List.**

Odesa, Nov. 13.—There is no evidence here of the immediate recidescence of the outbreak. There is, however, in circulation a list of mysterious origin, naming a hundred prominent Odesa citizens as proscribed for assassination. Seven thousand of the better class of inhabitants, including many foreigners, are leaving Odesa. Train and steamer tickets being heavily booked in advance.

**Freedom Of The Press.**

St. Petersburg, Nov. 13.—The law giving freedom to the press, which will remain operative until the duma meets has been completed and will be promulgated soon. It sweeps away all the old restrictions, leaving newspaper editors and proprietors subject only to the present criminal laws against libel, and inciting insurrection, libel, etc. Editions of papers can still be confiscated under the new law, but the censor must immediately place his reasons for so doing in the hands of the public prosecutor, who may summon the proprietor and editor before a legal tribunal for trial.

**Panic In Warsaw.**

Warsaw, Nov. 13.—The proclamation of martial law in all of the ten governments of Russian Poland has caused surprise and exasperation here, and there are apprehensions that it will provoke disturbances worse than those that have already taken place. Owing to the general strike the district is hourly increasing. There is a scarcity of food and coal.

**The Threatened Rising.**

St. Petersburg, Nov. 13.—The threatened rising was too elaborately advertised to succeed and was easily averted by the precautionary measures of the authorities. Fire arms were hurriedly purchased and among the novel expedients adopted for resisting the mob, an American lady had in readiness a large bottle of ammonia to smash on the entrance to her staircase, so that the fumes might render the place impregnable.

**CRUSHED TO PULP.**

**A Miner Killed, at Bankhead Mine, Alberta.**

Bank, Alta., Nov. 13.—James Graham was killed, on Saturday night, while at work in Bankhead mine. He with two others was at the foot of a incline, down which a coal car dashed, owing to the breaking of a cable. Graham was unable to get out of the way, and was crushed to a pulp. He was a native of Scotland, aged twenty-one and had no relatives in this country. The other workmen were uninjured.

**Spend \$160,000 On Water.**

New York, Nov. 13.—The plans for obtaining water from the Catskill region for Greater New York, at an expense of over \$160,000,000, submitted to the state water supply commission at their office in Albany by the water commissioners of New York, have been accepted for consideration, and a hearing will be given to all interested in the matter at the court house in Kingston, on November 27th.

**Man's Ear Bitten Off.**

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., Nov. 13.—In a bar-room fight at the Windsor Hotel, Saturday, William Jolliffe, but the right ear off Robert Lang, a blacksmith. The ear was taken off almost as if cut with a knife. Jolliffe was brought to trial, before St. J. Magistrate Quill, last evening, and being convicted, was sentenced to two years less one day in the Central Prison.

**TARIFF COMMISSION**

**Has Begun Its Sittings in Toronto.**

Toronto, Nov. 13.—The Dominion tariff commission began its sittings here, this morning. President J. D. Allan of the board of trade, opened the proceedings in a brief speech, in which he said he did not believe, in the case for the moment had yet been adequately presented to the commission. Hon. Mr. Fielding, in responding, observed that the commission was above all things, an open public enquiry, and they desired that any persons who had anything to say would come in open meeting and present their views.

James McEwing, Drayton, president of the Farmers' Association of Ontario, was then called. He admitted that the conditions, in Canada, required a tariff for revenue. But those duties should be levied in such a manner as to produce the best results.

"We claim," declared Mr. McEwing, "that the agricultural interest is the greatest wealth-producing, as well as the greatest consuming body in the community. We also claim that the present tariff discriminates against the agricultural interests, and that in any revision of the tariff, this injustice should be removed to as great an extent as possible. This could be most easily done if the tendency is towards a lower general tariff."

Mr. McEwing read the following resolution passed at the last meeting of the Farmers' Association: "Resolved that we oppose any increase in the tariff now in force, endorse the British preference, and are of the opinion that if the principle of maximum and minimum tariffs be adopted, the maximum tariff should be no greater than that at present in force."

Mr. McEwing said the farmers would be willing to have the tariff on farm produce if they received relief as consumers. W. L. Smith and E. C. Drury, also gave evidence for the farmers.

**ARRESTED JAP AGITATORS**

**Former Speaker and Members of Parliament.**

New York, Nov. 13.—A cable to the San from Tokyo, says: "A sensation was created here to-day, by the arrest of Hironako Kono, former speaker of the lower house, and three of his associate members of parliament, on charges of complicity in the riots last September, following the signing of the peace treaty at Portsmouth. Kono, who is the leader of the progressives, is an inveterate agitator, and has spent several years in prison. It is believed the arrests explain the prolonged continuance of martial law in Tokyo."

**BOARD OF TRADE**

**Will Hear Address From Chamberlain's Secretary.**

Montreal, Nov. 13.—W. A. S. Hevins, who is secretary to the Right Hon. Mr. Chamberlain's tariff commission, has accepted the invitation of the executive committee of the board of trade to address the members of that board on the subject of "The Trade Relations Between the Mother Country and Canada." A special general meeting of the board of trade will, therefore, be held at 12:15 on Thursday, of this week, 16th inst., for the purpose of hearing Mr. Hevins.

**ARCHBISHOP'S SYMPATHY.**

**His Grace Sends Message to Metropolitan.**

The Archbishop of Canterbury, Most Rev. Randall Thomas Davidson, addressed a telegram, which he followed by a sympathetic letter, to Antonius, metropolitan of St. Petersburg, expressing the hope that "the benediction of our happily inaugurated may by God's merciful providence be the recurrence of the fearful scenes which have caused the deepest sorrow among all Christian men, and offering on behalf of the Church of England, co-operation in any possible manner towards attaining that end."

**SHOT TWICE AT GOVERNOR.**

**Wife of Municipal Councillor Wounds Governor.**

Mogilev, Russia, Nov. 13.—The wife of Municipal Councillor Barsky, under the name of Baroness Mendeloff, obtained entrance to a reception given by Governor Klingenberg and fired two shots from a revolver at the governor, wounding him in the abdomen and arm.

**TO BE ASKED FOR AID.**

Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 13.—The Jews of Ottawa have started a fund for the relief of oppressed Jews in Russia. A preliminary meeting for organization \$200 was subscribed. Every Hebrew in the vicinity will be canvassed.

**Considering Appeal.**

Toronto, Nov. 13.—The court of appeal, to-day, hearing the appeal of the Bank of Montreal, against the judgment of Justice Anglin, holding the bank liable for the amount of the Martineau frauds at Ottawa.

**Floated This Morning.**

New York, Nov. 13.—The steamship, Graf Waldersee, which went aground, Saturday, in the Upper Bay, while outbound for Hamburg, was floated, this morning. She had apparently sustained no damage.

**Many Killed.**

Johannesburg, Transvaal, Nov. 13.—A vertical shaft, in the Pristonfontein mine, collapsed today. One white man and sixty-seven natives were killed.

**OCCURRENCES RECOUNTED IN BRIEF FORM.**

**Matters That Interest Everybody**  
—Notes From All Over—Little Of Everything Easily Read And Remembered.

Alberto Moreno has been appointed consul-general of Panama at Hong-Kong.

The Bank of Commerce have purchased the site for a new office building in Halifax.

Andrew Carnegie has contributed a cheque of \$10,000 for the relief of the Jews in Russia.

A man named Sturgeon walked off the fishing tug Star at Fort Burwell and was drowned.

Robert Hall, Hamilton, was run down by a Grand Trunk freight train and fatally injured.

Child marriages in the North-West were discussed by the Dominion Women's Temperance union.

The Crosby Hotel, at Lake George, N.Y., was destroyed by fire, by alleged incendiarism.

Major F. E. Dixon and David Conroy, Toronto, both succumbed very suddenly from heart failure.

An earthquake destroyed the great church of the Russian monastery on Mount Athos. The damage was \$125,000.

G. C. Cressman, of the Guelph Agricultural College, was elected president of the American Association of Farmers.

Edna Wallace Hopper, prominent in light opera, was operated on for appendicitis at a sanitarium in New York.

Major F. E. Dixon and David Conroy, Toronto, both succumbed very suddenly from heart failure.

There were 1,800 guests at a marriage feast at Savignac, Brittany, and 300 servants waited on them in an open field.

At the conference of naphtha producers in St. Petersburg, the loss of property as a result of the recent revolution was estimated at \$2,000,000.

Garnet Scott was killed in the Grand Trunk yard at Niagara Falls, while endeavoring to couple a car, the drawhead of which had broken away.

Jefferson Lawyer, one of the oldest and most highly respected residents of Brownville, N. Y., died on Sunday morning, aged seventy-four years.

Because he was promoted in his classes James Sniko, a Pittsburgh schoolboy, worked at his classmates, and received injuries from which he died.

At New York, five thousand persons visited the armored cruiser Drake, flagship of Rear Admiral Paul Louis of Hattenberg, between the hours of one and four o'clock, Sunday.

Secretary Bonaparte has ordered a court-martial for the trial of Midshipman Minor Meriwether, jr., in connection with the death of Midshipman Branch, which followed a fist fight between the two naval students.

Friends of John N. Tisdale, a wealthy mining man, who disappeared, Monday, in New York, under peculiar circumstances, advance the theory that Tisdale's disappearance is the outcome of the cattlemen's war in Wyoming fifteen years ago.

The New York Herald announces that \$3,000,000 has been subscribed for a new hall for thirty men in the metropolis. The site will be the whole block between Sixty-second and Sixty-third streets, facing Central park, and will cost \$1,000,000.

In building the foundation for a lunatic asylum, worked at Carsholm, discovered the ruins of a fortified British village covering four acres. The pottery and other objects found indicate that the fortress had been occupied up to half a century before Christ.

James Speyer of New York has given to the trustees of Columbia University, New York, the sum of \$50,000 to endow the Theodore Roosevelt professorship of American history and institutions in the University of Berlin, in accordance with the plan approved by the German emperor.

**CHICKENS HAVE CAT FOR CHUM.**

In the window of a New York dealer in poultry supplies may be seen a young tiger striped cat living in peace and harmony with a lively brood of fluffy little yellow chickens.

The cat curls itself up and dozes comfortably here, quite undisturbed by the chickens, and never offering to molest them, while the little chicks, quite fearless, walk over the cat's body and stand up on top of it and peck at it for grains of food that may have been thrown upon its coat by the quick moving feet of other chicks, scratching for food in another quarter.

The display space in the window is divided in the middle by a length of wire netting running back from the glass. On one side are the cat and the little chicks, while on the other side of the wire netting is a lot of half-grown chickens. When the cat, in its compartment, walks along by that dividing wire fence in the window the half-grown chickens on the other side run along. They are afraid of the cat, but the little chickens in the same compartment with it have no fear of it whatever.
