They Say—Latter Favoured
Many Concessions to Autono-
omy Till Kaiser Interposed.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 14.—The dele-

gates from Poland here to learn

of the Polish position, under the mani-

fest, speak with the greatest anger against

Premier Witte. In their interview,

which is marked by gross rudeness on

his part, the premier told them, cur-

tly, the terms of a proclamation, is-

sued yesterday. When they sought to

argue against the Polish law, as prevent-

ing the national movement of

advancing the St. Petersburg govern-

ment regarding its position under the

new Russian regime, Witte rapped

upon the table and said: "All that

is already settled, as I have told

you." When the delegates persisted,

he added: "You have heard the

government's decision. The matter is

closed."

Several of the candidates accuse

Witte of secret bargains with the

kaiser that the reforms should include

no concessions to Polish nationalism,

and when the czar suddenly made

large concessions to the nationalist

party of Finland, the kaiser informed

Witte that nothing similar would be

tolerated in the case of Poland. The

delegates maintain that Witte is a

greater enemy to Polish nationalism

than the czar, who favored consider-

able concessions in the direction of

autonomy, till the czar and Witte

met at the Diet yesterday, regarding the

concessions of autonomy to Poland

impossible.

Russia Will Lose Georgia.

London, Nov. 14.—According to the

Times' St. Petersburg correspondent,

the Polish communists will lead to a

final and absolute rupture between the

government and the liberals, and will

seriously complicate the Russian situa-

tion. Already the union of unions has

issued resolutions condemning the ac-

tion of the government and declaring

that the Polish liberation movement

is part and parcel of Russia's fight for

freedom, thereby signifying that Pol-

and's cause will be taken up vigor-

ously.

The St. Petersburg correspondent of

the Daily Mail represents Georgia as

being lost to Russia. He says that

210,000 Georgians armed with modern

rifles, hold the country, and are ready

to repel three important Russian for-

ces that are converging upon them.

Two army corps will be required to

reconquer the country, but even one

cannot be spared owing to the gen-

eral anarchy in the Caucasus; moreover,

the railway men are in sympathy with

rebels, and they have stopped commu-

nication in regard to the Jewish mas-

sakers.

More Disquieting News.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 14.—Inquieting

news of the progress of agrarian dis-

orders were received.

The military authorities are rushing

troops and machine guns into affected areas.

Inhabitants of Karsk and Tagansk are

organizing for the protection of their

towns. The village of Balandia has

been fired by peasants.

And another movement has been

blown up by a floating mine off the

coast of China. Only one fatality is

reported.

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
