EIGHT MEN LOSE THEIR LIVES IN A MINE.

Terrific Gas Explosion—Huge Pieces of Timber Were Blown Like Sky Rockets 150 Feet in the Air. Monongahela City, Pa., Nov. 16.—Undoubtedly killed and probably blown to pieces, seven men are lying in the depths of the new shaft of the Brazzell Coal company on the outskirts of Bentleyville, while another outside the mine is dead, as the result of a gas explosion yesterday.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 16.—The statement is made in high quarters that an imperial ukase will be issued shortly, whereby a very large portion of the imperial domain, the whole of which comprises about one-third of Russia in Europe, will pass to the peasant.
