Dr. Brien is Suing for His Services. Essex, Ont., Nov. 17.-The Rudden murder, at Windsor, two years ago, for which the colored man Slaughter is now serving time in Kingston, is recalled by a suit brought by Dr. Brien, of this place, against Mrs. Rudden for \$75 for professional services rendered Rudden during his illness. It is claimed that Dr. Brien treated Rudden for typhoid fever, but it was later found that Rudden was suffering from a fractured skull, caused by a blow from a billiard cue, in the hands of Slaughter, who was charged with having caused his death and convicted. Windsor doctors who performed the autopsy on Rudden testified in the suit, at Windsor, yesterday, that there was no evidence of typhoid at the time of Rudden's death.

A FALSE MAN

He Claims To Be The Russian Emperor. MANY FOLLOWERS. HE HAS MADE APPEARANCE NEAR PENZA.

An Appeal Made to the Workmen by Count Witte-He Will Do All He Possibly Can-Russia May Repudiate Her Debts.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 17.-A false emperor has suddenly made his appearance near Penza and already his followers number 50,000. This is the startling report received in a despatch from Penza in the loss of which the vast region extending westward from the Volga, where agrarian uprisings on a large scale have been occurring and if the report turns out to be that that is possible for the country, the government will soon face, besides its other troubles, a formidable agrarian rebellion. It required a year to suppress the famous rebellion that was led by Pugatcheff, who impersonated the dethroned and murdered Peter III, in the time of Catherine II. That uprising was started in the same region on the banks of the Volga.

Appeals To The Workmen. St. Petersburg, Nov. 17.-Count Witte has issued an appeal to the workmen to consider their families, and the future industrial life of Russia, which, he says, is being ruined by the present strike policy. He assures the men that the newly-created ministry of commerce and labor will forthwith deal with the workmen's questions. "Give us time and we will do all that is possible for you. Listen to the advice of a man who loves you, and wishes you well." These words closed Count Witte's appeal. The effect upon the strikers was contrary to what was intended, the opposition being strengthened instead of decreased. However, it is not certain that an irreconcilable attitude will be maintained. The dissatisfaction of a section of workmen, noted in these despatches, was emphasized, yesterday, notwithstanding the fact that the actual number of strikers increased. There was fighting in some industrial parts of the city between strikers and non-strikers.

Although the protest is a political one, it is some way associated with the movement of workmen to obtain an eight-hour day. The makers of eighty-two mills here have associated to resist this demand. If the men work eight hours they will be locked out. The social democrats who are instigating the movement for shorter hours, say that the men are locked out they will burn mills, drawing lots to decide which. The managers say that eighty per cent. of the men have been terrorized into joining the movement.

Pardons have been granted to the Kronstadt mariners, except six, who were shot yesterday.

Dripping Towards Ruin. London, Nov. 17.-The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Telegraph says that a financial panic is prevailing in Russia, he adds, is drifting toward ruin. Trade, commerce and industry are at a standstill. The workmen are poverty stricken, yet are dissatisfied with the situation. The schools are closed. The railway and telegraph are working fitfully. Everything is topsy-turvy. The export trade has terribly declined in consequence of the strike, which, gold is steadily flowing out of the country. The outlook, the correspondent points out, will become worse, unless the political situation changes for the better.

Russia May Repudiate Debt. Berlin, Nov. 17.-German holders of Russian bonds are beginning to feel extremely uneasy over the situation in Russia. They realize that it is bound to affect adversely the economic conditions of the Russian empire, and the financial standing of the government. The foreign holders of Russian securities are greatly interested in the future of the empire and devour the disquieting reports of riot and bloodshed with avidity. Many millions are in the hands of German capitalists, and to that extent they are interested in the preservation of Russia's financial integrity.

An article published by Prof. Ballou, an official of the German statistical department among German investors in Russian securities. In that article, which is considered semi-official, he states that the Russian government has been considering the advisability of declaring partial bankruptcy, partially repudiating the country's foreign liabilities, for months past. In June, he declares, the Russian government commissioned a number of experts to elaborate reports on the effect that partial repudiation of foreign liabilities would produce on Russia's own economic development. The Mittag Zeitung describes Prof. Ballou's repudiations as a bombshell to all investors in Russian securities. The same panic feeling which has been caused here by this article, also seems to exist in England, and the Manchester Guardian is authority for the statement that the scheme to repudiate British capital in rebuilding the Russian navy has been abandoned and that the plan for Americans to under-

CAN BE HEARD

At The Meetings Of Tariff Commission. THROUGHOUT THE WESTERN ONTARIO TO BE WELL COVERED.

The Commissioners Have Arranged to Listen to the Statements of People at Various Centres-The Board of Trade Will Arrange Hearings.

Toronto, Nov. 17.-It has been decided that the tariff commission will hold sittings in London on Monday and Tuesday, November 20th and 21st respectively. The meetings there are expected to cover besides London, places within easy reach of that city, such as St. Thomas, Woodstock, Ingersoll, Stratford, St. Mary's, Strathroy, Warton and other towns north. On Wednesday, 22nd inst., sessions will be held in the afternoon and evening at Windsor. On Thursday morning, 23rd inst., the commission proceeded to Chatham, at the special request of the farmers of that district. Sessions will be held on Friday and Saturday, 24th and 25th inst., at Hamilton. Bradford will be visited on Monday, 25th inst.; Guelph on the 26th, Berlin on 29th, and Peterboro, on 30th. The secretary of the board of trade, at each of these meeting places, will receive applications and make arrangements for hearings.

A band of counterfeiters have been arrested at Schleiss, Prussia, who made a specialty of turning out American notes.

Very Rev. Charles D. Williams, dean of Trinity cathedral, Cleveland, was elected bishop of the Episcopal diocese of Michigan on the second ballot of the diocesan convention.

John Krup, indicted for illegal voting in the recent New York municipal election, failed to appear for pleading and his attorneys expressed ignorance as to his whereabouts. Earlier in the day Krup's release had been secured on a \$5,000 cash bond. The bond was forfeited.

Will Enter Customs Union. Cape Town, Nov. 17.-It has been announced that Northwestern Rhodesia will enter the South African Customs Union on December 1st, next, with the same status as Bechuanaland and Betsuanaland Protectorate. One effect of this is the adoption of the customs union preference on British goods by this territory. It is further stated that articles 14 and 15 of the customs convention will apply to Southern Rhodesia. These articles contain technical provisions which were inserted to meet the requirements of Southern Rhodesia.

A Serious Fire. Campbellford, Ont., Nov. 17.-The barns and outbuildings of Ernest Cassan, a farmer here, were accidentally destroyed by fire, last night, with all the live stock, including twenty cows, seven horses, a number of hogs and fowls, the season's crop of grain and implements, which, at a loss about \$7,000; insurance, \$1,200. Cause of fire unknown.

Nearly Blew Head Off. Manitoba, Man., Nov. 17.-Robert Gray, Brockton, was accidentally shot, yesterday afternoon, a few miles out of Hiaito. While he was taking his gun out of the buggy, the weapon accidentally went off, the contents almost blowing his head off. Gray was a single man.

Has Gone To Montreal. Windsor, Ont., Nov. 17.-Sister St. John the Evangelist, mother superior of St. Mary's academy, who was badly injured in a runaway a few weeks ago, has sufficiently recovered to be removed to Montreal where she will spend the winter.

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AMERICA THE NEWEST.

More Papers Printed There Than Any Where Else.

Washington, Nov. 17.-More newspapers are printed in the United States than in any other country in the world, and it is the belief of the bureau of manufacturers, of the department of commerce and labor, that the dailies and weeklies in this country nearly equal in numbers the dailies and weeklies published in all Europe. According to the statistics in the Revue Hebdomadaire, and transmitted to this country by Consul-General Guenther, of Frankfurt, Germany, that country leads European countries with 5,530 newspapers, of which 800 are dailies. England is second with 3,000 of which 809 are dailies. France, Italy, Austria-Hungary, Spain, Russia, Greece and Switzerland follow in order. Asia has not less than 3,000 periodicals, and Africa 200 dailies. America is given 12,500 papers, but the bureau of manufacturers declares this incorrect and quotes figures for the year 1903, showing that 17,333 were published here, of which 2,215 were dailies.

STEEL INGOT THEIR TOMB

To Be Buried in Metal That Incorporated Them.

Philadelphia, Nov. 17.-The strangest funeral service ever recorded will occur at the plant of the Midvale Steel works Saturday. November 10th John Forkin and Joseph Gazia were engulfed in 82,000 pounds of molten steel flowing from a leaky furnace into a pit where they toiled. In the flash of an eye not a vestige of the two men was left and scarcely a puff of smoke arose to indicate their complete incineration.

In deference to the feelings of the members of the men's families the company will bury 8,000 pounds of steel, supposed to be that part of the mass into which it is thought the bodies were absorbed, with all the formalities and rites attending an ordinary funeral.

GALLOWES TO BE ERECTED. Deputy Sheriff Receives Notice from the Governor.

Rutland, Vt., Nov. 17.-Deputy Sheriff L. D. Hazen, South Royalton, has received official notice from Governor Bell to prepare at once for the execution of Mrs. Mary Rogers on December 8th, and work will begin at once erecting at Windsor prison the gallows which have twice been erected in sight of the woman's cell, only to be taken down as reprieves gave a Governor Bell's order to Deputy Hazen is taken to mean that the state officials have little hope of the United States supreme court allowing the petition for a writ of habeas corpus for Mrs. Rogers, which is now before it.

Death Of James Paton. Montreal, Nov. 17.-James Paton, one of the best known yachtmen and all round patron of amateur sports died, to-day. He was a member of the contracting firm of Paton, Laird & Co. He was a man of about fifty-five years of age.
