HOMESTEAD REQULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Domin, lon Lands in Manitoba or the North-west Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 Entry may be made personally at the

local land office for the district in which the land to be taken in situated, or if the the land to be taken is situated, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottaws, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg. or the local agent for the district in which the land is situate, receive authority for some one to make entry for him.
HOMESTEAD DUTIES: A settler who
has been granted an entry for a home. required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one

the following plans : (1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.


