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THE BURNSIDE GAME SAID TO BE PRETTY BUT NOT EFFECTIVE.

So Chaucer Elliott Said to a Toronto Reporter - Working Back on the Game of Baseball - Sporting Notes.

"Chaucer" Elliott, who was in the old days - not so very long ago, either - some of the best players himself, was in the city to know the game between the Rough Riders and Varsity for the championship of Canada.

In conversation with a representative of the Toronto News to get something to say regarding the football situation as it exists in Canada to-day. In the first place, he considers it high time that something was done to give a semblance of unification to the rules as they obtain in different unions, and, in the second place, he is very emphatically of the opinion that the Burnside game does not afford the ultimate degree of excellence in this respect.

"The situation as regards the rules under which football is played at present is very unsatisfactory," he remarked. "Of course, the Hamilton Tigers and the Toronto Varsity and the Rough Riders, of Ottawa. It is just as well that this is so. Even if they did the game would be a farce on one side all the time, and very much of a farce on the other side of the time. By that I mean that the Rough Riders would be practically unable to play the snapback game, no matter how much they might try, while the Varsity would at least be able to make a bluff at playing the scrimmage game. What kind of a championship would accrue from such an exhibition? To even state the case is to indicate very clearly the desirability of having all the Canadian teams playing under the same set of rules. All would then have an equal chance to attain efficiency.

As for the Burnside game, I have had some little experience with it, coaching the teams in Kingston. The scrimmage game, as developed by the Rough Riders, is almost entirely a line game; but the backs are protected in good shape, and get a chance to work at open time. And the game is in no way more of the gentle variety either. First, with Queen's College, and afterwards with the Granites the year they won the championship of Canada, I was in some pretty fierce encounters. So that it may be taken for granted that I know what I am talking about when I say that football under the old rules did not require to be any rougher than football should be. Possibly the Burnside rules have minimized the danger of injury to the player, but at the same time, it has materially lessened the interest from the standpoint of the spectator.

"I am not in favor of interference, as it is practised in the United States, but I do say, that running interference should be permitted. The old game of the line men making an opening for a half to run through is past. If he did so in the Burnside game he would be immediately declared off side. And yet these tactics were what played to the interest and excitement of football, and it was wont to be played on other days. Similarly, if a man runs around the end, and is properly protected by one of his fellows, that too will not be found to content that this species of running interference does other than enhance the spirited nature of the pastime."

Hunting For Origin of Baseball.

A difference of opinion as to the origin of baseball led Albert G. Spalding of New York, Samuel Winslow of Worcester, Mass., and Charles H. MacDonell, of this place, to pay a visit to John W. Oliver, the veteran pitcher of the Yonkers State team. Mr. Oliver is nearly ninety-one years old, but is still active and is at his desk every day. Mr. Spalding had heard that the editor of the Statesman had played baseball long before there is any published record of the game, and the visit was made to hear something about the game as it was played prior to 1830. Henry Chadwick has claimed that baseball developed from the English game of "rounders," while Mr. Spalding is of the opinion that the game had its origin in the colonial game of "cat o' nine tails."

Mr. Oliver said his recollection was clear as to how the game was played from 1825 to 1835 in Baltimore. He said it was known as baseball as far back as 1825, and that the players ran bases just as they do now, as far as the official records of baseball go, this year completes the sixtieth year of the life of baseball.

The Toronto association football team was defeated by the All-Philadelphia team in a game played at the Philadelphia grounds on Saturday.

The Ottawa and Wanderers have signed a compact which virtually constitutes an offensive and defensive alliance. The teams agree to stick together, and in the Federal Hockey League, should anything happen that would be to the disadvantage of either, they will have to stand together. Double header games will be played this year between Ottawa and Wanderers, the majority of goals to count, and the presidency of the league will likely be held by one of the Ottawa men. The Wanderers stuck to Ottawa when the latter were in difficulties, and the champions now refuse to go back on their old friends.

The Peterboroughs are confident of defeating the Rough Riders II in the game for the Canadian championship at Ottawa, this afternoon. Louis Leclair, an old Brockville player, is on the team, and Thornton, one of the old Quebec rules, while the line-up has also been found on the lineup, as well as Chris. Graham, a former Peterboro quarterback. They will be in the game during the half which is to be played under Quebec rules, while the line-up for the half under Ontario rules will be practically the same as that which defeated Dundas on Saturday. NEWS OF CHURCHES

THE VARIOUS DOINGS IN THE RELIGIOUS WORLD.

Sending Missionaries to the Dark Places of the Earth - Trial For Heresy and the Clergyman Won the Case.

The total number of parishes in England is 13,845.

Rev. Rural-Dean Davidson of Peterborough, is appointed to a canonry in St. Alban's cathedral.

The Methodists of the United States have undertaken the task of raising \$200,000 for an Indian jubilee fund.

Rev. George Warren, Lakefield, has been appointed archdeacon of Peterborough, in succession to the late Archbishop Allan.

Rev. A. J. McMillivray of London, has received a call to the pastorate of St. John's Presbyterian church in Vancouver, B.C.

Rev. D. J. Neugevirtz of Montreal, is coming to Ottawa to establish a Jewish mission, under the auspices of the Church of England.

Rev. Dr. S. P. Ross, Hamilton, has accepted an invitation to become pastor of the new Methodist church, on Broadway, near Gunning.

Rev. Arthur Carlisle, assistant to the rector of the Memorial church, London, Ont., was ordained to the priesthood by Bishop Baldwin.

Father Boulet, a venerable Oregon priest, has written an abundance of this world's goods, is devoting some of his wealth to building churches.

It is considered somewhat remarkable that the Archbishops of Canterbury and York, and the Bishops of London and St. Stephen are all Scotchmen.

The Church Missionary Society of England, though burdened with an accumulated deficit of about \$300,000, is sending out fifty-six new missionaries.

In Ireland there are 3,310,300 Catholics, 579,300 Episcopalians, 504,749 Protestants and Methodists, and 62,281 belonging to other denominations.

Andrew Carnegie has promised \$500 to the renovation of the organ of St. Finn Bar's cathedral, Cork, in connection that a similar amount be raised for the renovation of the organ of St. Stephen's cathedral, Toronto.

The Wesleyan Missionary Society of England is sending out this year twenty-nine new missionaries to different foreign fields, though sixteen of these are to fill vacancies.

Patrick Baptist church has extended a call to Rev. Dr. Thomas, formerly minister of Jarvis Street Baptist church, Toronto. Dr. Thomas is one of the best beloved ministers of the Baptist church in Canada.

Rev. Ezekiel L. Pyle, for several years pastor of the Emmanuel Congregational church, Watertown, N.Y., has presented his resignation, that he may accept a call given him to the Parkville Congregational church, of Brooklyn.

E. Vickers, a leading member of the Methodist church, in New South Wales, has bought the Lyceum Theatre and hotel in Pitt street, Sydney, and adjoining property, for about \$170,000, and will hand the whole over to the Sydney Central Methodist Mission.

Rev. J. B. DeWelle Cowie, Hampton, N.H., has been elected rector of the parish of Fredericton to fill the vacancy created by the death of the late Canon Roberts. This parish is one of the richest and best livings in the province of New Brunswick, the glebe lands yielding large revenues.

A trial for heresy has been held in Holland, Rev. Dr. Bahler of the Dutch Reformed Church having been charged with preaching the doctrines of karma and reincarnation. Dr. Bahler argued that these were Christian teachings, and the committee of clergymen selected to try the case decided in his favor.

Prospere properly reached high tide in the case of a man who was about to undergo an operation for appendicitis, and he declared that he did not want the operation to be performed until his pastor could be present. "Why do you want your pastor present?" asked the physician. "Because I wish to be opened with prayer," was the reply.
