SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 2 and 26, not covered, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land to be taken is situated, or if the homesteaded person is away, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent for the district in which the land is situated, receive authority for some one to make entry for him.

HOMESTEAD DUTIES: A settler who has been granted an entry for a homestead is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under the following classes:

- (1) At least one month's residence upon the land in each year and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of years.
- (2) If the settler for "minors," if the father is deceased or any person who is obliged to make a homestead entry under the provisions of this Act as a homesteaded person in the vicinity of the land entered for by such person as a homesteaded person, the requirements of this Act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by the settler residing with his father or mother.
- (3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon the land, he is required to reside upon the land in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

APPLICATION FOR PATENT should be made at the end of three years, before the Local Agent, Sub-Agent or the Homestead Inspector.

Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention to do so.

FEAR WATER TANKS.

Staple Industry May Be Forced to Close Down.

Londonderry, Dec. 4.—This city is at present seriously short a water supply. Only 11,000,000 gallons of water remain in the several reservoirs, and the nominal consumption is between eight and nine million gallons per week. Practically nothing more has come into the reservoirs than has been taken out, so that it may be said that the city is almost at the mercy of the rainfall. The town clerk has sent notices to the large shirt manufacturers warning them that it will be necessary to shut off the supply. This step, if taken, would involve the stoppage of the staple industry of the city, which gives employment to many thousands of hands.

IMMIGRATION FROM BRITAIN.

Preston Expects 100,000 to Come Next Year.

Toronto, Dec. 4.—Forecasting an immigration from Britain next year of 100,000, and a time when it will reach \$50,000 annually, W. T. R. Preston, Dominion immigration agent in London, spoke to Toronto on the subject in regard to his work across the seas. He is here on a brief visit. Australia, however, he says, is a serious rival, and by means of a royal commission report, which slanders this country, is doing its best to sidetrack the Canadian rush. The immigration work of the Salvation Army is the biggest of its sort that England has ever seen.

Mr. Preston denies that England is being drained of agricultural labor.

"We could take half a million every year for twenty years, and it would not materially affect the general labor or market," I attended Lord Tonnyson's committee meeting, dealing with Rider Haggard's scheme, and the opinion was strongly expressed that this emigration was a means of relieving the distress in Great Britain. There is too much of the paternal feeling in England. Much help is given and a certain class comes to depend on this and becomes a regular charge on the country. By coming out here they have to shift for themselves, which is often just what they need."

JAPAN'S BUDGET FIGURES.

Financial Scheme, on Reasonably Good Basis.

London, Dec. 4.—The correspondent of the Daily Telegraph at Tokio sends a detailed outline of the provisions of the Japanese budget for 1905.

These include the withdrawal of the army in Manchuria at a cost of \$190,000,000 and gifts to soldiers and sailors approximating \$75,000,000.

It is estimated that the total expenditures called for will be \$515,000,000, of which sum \$400,000,000 may be set down as the outcome of the war.

The Tokio correspondent of the Times says the budget provides \$55,000,000 annually for the payment of the debt incurred by the war, which will be fully redeemed in about thirty years. Altogether, according to the correspondent, Japan's financial scheme is on a much better basis than could reasonably have been expected after such a war.

FORCING HOME RULE.

Balfour Writes Significantly to Eye-Election Candidate.

London, Dec. 4.—Evidence of the intention of the Unionist party to force the question of home rule for Ireland to the forefront in the impending election struggle is shown in a message sent by Premier Balfour to a Unionist candidate in a bye-election, in which the premier says he hopes the electors "will set an example of determined resistance to those home rule proposals, which, as we have recently heard from the leader of the opposition, once again threaten the country."

The political gossipers are busy with cabinet-making for the liberal party. The names suggested are interesting as forecasting the return to office of Sir Charles Dilke, who has been for twenty years without a portfolio.

The Traffic Report.

Detroit, Mich., Dec. 4.—Traffic reported by the government, shows November's tonnage through the St. Lawrence canals to have been 5,006,543. The total for the season, to date, is 43,000,172, some 12,000,000 ahead of the same period last year. The total for the year will be about 44,000,000 or \$800,000 more than any other year in the history of the canals. The total November tonnage through the canals was 467,212.

Part of the Italian cabinet has resigned and Premier Forbes asks for all to do so.

Over \$10,000 was raised in Pittsburgh, Pa., for the sufferers from the Russian massacre.
