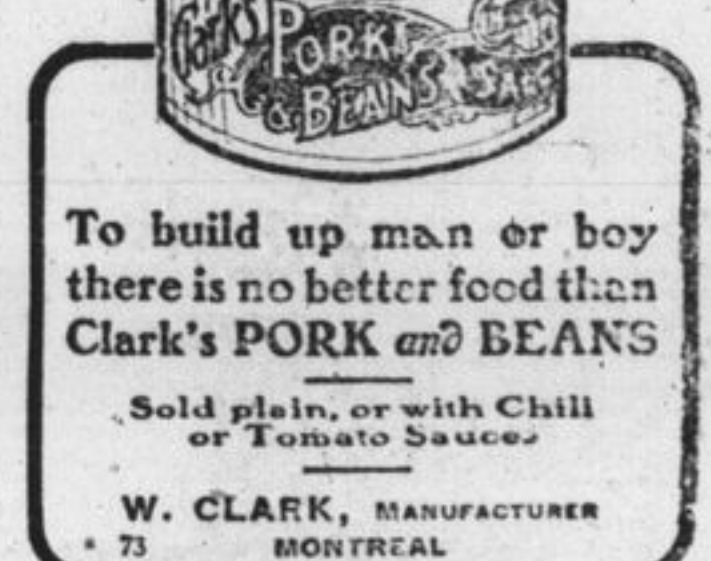

RESTRAINT SOUGHT IN CASE OF YORK COUNTY LOAN COMPANY.

And Canada Permanent—Port Arthur and Rainy River Election Case Before Court of Appeal—Argument Not Concluded.

Toronto, Dec. 11.—Christopher John Parsons, Brampton, acting for himself and other shareholders of the York County Savings and Loan company, today, issued a writ against the York County Loan, and the Canada Permanent to restrain these companies from completing the proposed transfer of the assets of the York County Loan, under a provisional agreement of November 22nd, and also to declare this agreement void and cancelled. The Port Arthur and Rainy River election case is before the court of appeal today. At the trial of the protest, entered by W. A. Preston, the defendant, conservative candidate, against the return of H. S. Kennedy, illegal acts on the part of William Atkins were proven, but the trial court held that it had not been shown that Atkins was an agent of the respondent. An appeal was taken against this finding, and J. F. Hollmuth, for the appellant, is arguing that not only was there a verbal agreement between Atkins and the liberals, but also that Atkins had actually written authority, inasmuch as he acted as a scrivener for Kennedy. The argument was not concluded.

As a result of the appointment of A. F. Smith to the position of general inspector of trains, stations and dispatching offices, on the eastern division of the Canadian Pacific, some changes have been made in the dispatching office here. H. E. Kelly, formerly chief night dispatcher, is appointed chief dispatcher, and W. A. Killenworth has been appointed chief night dispatcher. Another Canadian Pacific appointment is that of J. J. Wilson, formerly car distributor here, who has been placed in charge of the fast freight car movements at Montreal.

E. Boland, formerly western traveling freight agent of the Dominion line, has been appointed western freight agent of the Donaldson and Thompson steamship lines. D. O. Wood succeeds the late J. D. Hunter as western freight agent of the Allan line.

An outbreak of small-pox has occurred in one of the lumber camps in Chandos, county of Peterboro. Before the doctor could get there some of the men had escaped from the camp, which is now quarantined. There are sixty-two known cases of small-pox in the township.

The railway commission is sitting in Toronto, today, and this morning heard the case of the city of St. Catharines, against the Grand Trunk, the Port Dover, St. Catharines, and Thorold, and the Niagara, St. Catharines, and Toronto railways. St. Catharines desires these roads to purchase \$22,764, the cost of a bridge over Queenston street, St. Catharines. The commission advised the parties to try and come together, and their representatives are going out conferring. When sitting in Chatham recently, the commission gave a verbal order, permitting the Wallaceburg & Lake Erie railway to cross the Pere Marquette tracks at Wallaceburg. This order was not officially issued, but the crossing was put in on Saturday, and was torn up by the Pere Marquette yesterday. The commission issued the order, officially, today, and the crossing, consequently, will now have to be replaced.

The James Bay railway is asking to cross the Grand Trunk, on the level, at Akana Island, near Washago, county of Ontario. Mr. Cavan, for the Grand Trunk, objected to this as being dangerous, and advocated a high level bridge. Gerald Kihl, for the James Bay railway, contended that with proper signals, the crossing would be perfectly safe. Decision will probably be given this afternoon.

WILLIAM J. SPICER DEAD.

Prominent in Grand Trunk Railway Circles. Detroit, Mich., Dec. 11.—William J. Spicer, for many years prominently identified with the Grand Trunk railway, died at his home in Detroit, last night after a prolonged illness. Mr. Spicer was born in London, Eng., in 1833, and came to Canada, when he was twenty-three years of age. He was for several years freight agent at Hamilton, for the old Great Western railway. About 1881 he became associated with C. J. Brydges, then general manager of the Grand Trunk, as superintendent of that road. When in 1884, the Great Western was absorbed by the Grand Trunk, Mr. Spicer became general manager of Grand Trunk lines, west of Detroit and St. Clair river. He held this position until about ten years ago, when he retired from active work, but remained as a director on the various Grand Trunk boards.

BABY SOLD FOR 50 CENTS.

Woman Makes Strange Allegation Against Husband. London, Dec. 11.—Remarkable evidence as to a father's callousness was given recently at the Wood Green police court by Mrs. Joseph Bell, who summoned her husband for persistent cruelty.

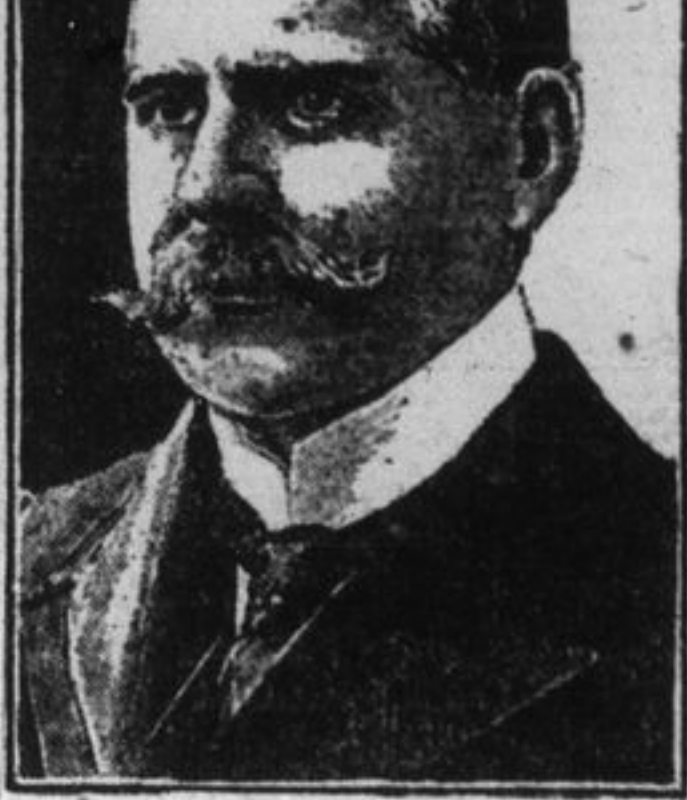
Mrs. Bell said that her husband continually beat her, and that he had sold their baby to a man for fifty cents.

He threatened to kill her, she said, and on one occasion set the house on fire, and she had to jump out of a window with her child alive. Bell pleaded guilty and a separation order was granted with alimony.

GREAT LAKES' DEATH ROLL.

Some 116 Perished in Wrecks of Vessels. Chicago, Dec. 11.—According to figures compiled today by the Lake Marine News Bureau, the death list on the great lakes during the season now closing has been the heaviest of any year since by steel vessels began to be used on the lakes. A total of 215-lives were lost.

Of these, 116 were lost during the three great storms of this fall. The remaining ninety-nine were lost by falling overboard and like causes.

So delightful is the atmosphere of the tale, and so delicate is the art revealed, that it should take rank with Harland's "The Cardinal's Spill-Pdx."

New York, Dec. 11.—Herr Fritz Loser, eldest son of a Berlin multi-millionaire known as the tobacco king of Germany, became acquainted recently with Miss Maubel Benham, a young lady of great beauty, employed as a stenographer in a factory here.

He fell in love with her, and has now cabled to his mother, who is a widow, asking her consent to his marriage.

Glanders In The West.

Portage la Prairie, Dec. 11.—P. Ingram, farmer, had to shoot twelve horses on account of glanders. A farm of 450 acres was sold near here today for \$40 an acre, establishing almost a record for farming land in the west.

A LIVERPOOL MAN ARRESTED IN MONTREAL ON EXTRADITION WARRANT.

Dismissed, as He Had Not Enough Money on Him to Justify Charge—Church Badly Damaged by Fire.

Montreal, Dec. 11.—James Sugden, a Liverpool merchant, was arrested here, a month ago, on warrant of extradition, being wanted in Liverpool, on a charge of leaving the country with money belonging to his creditors. The bankruptcy law compels his arrest and extradition, but when he arrived, he had only eighteen pounds in his possession. The law requires that he must have twenty pounds or more, but the prosecution claimed that the price of the steamship ticket, twelve pounds, must be added to the eighteen. Commissioner Lamontagne decided against this contention, and dismissed the accused.

The Church of Our Lady of Angels, Roman Catholic, at the corner of LaGauchetiere and Cheniville street, was considerably damaged by fire this morning. Repairs had been going on for a month, and it is supposed that some oil, used by painters, caught fire in the attic, close to the steeple. The church is connected with the work of St. Vincent de Paul Society. A few thousand dollars will cover the loss.

KISS ALBUM LATEST FAD.

London Girl Invents Curious Campaign For Autograph Book. A clever young Kensington woman, Miss Evans, has devised a new kind of autograph album that is likely to be popular. It is contrived so as to enable the young woman not only to collect the autograph signatures of her friends, but to preserve also the imprints of their kisses.

The book is equipped with a little pad of a soluble carmine-tinted substance upon which the first are lightly pressed so as to take up a little of pigment. "Then the kiss is imprinted upon the page in a space provided for the purpose, leaving a clear carmine record of the pressure of the lips. By the side of the kiss print space is another for the autograph and the date, and to give a clear record of the signatures make a precious and intimate keepsake.

"It is really marvelous what a lot of character there is in kisses," says Miss Evans. "People who are not students of the subject have no idea how they vary. You know no two persons have fingers prints alike, and so no two persons have kisses of the same bit alike. I have 200 in one album and there is not one of them that you could possibly mistake for any other. The kiss prints look like kisses, too. The kiss album bears on the title page the motto: 'Give me a kiss for a keepsake and a quotation dear as the remembered kisses.' To be complete the Kiss album should be sprinkled liberally with kissing quotations from novelists as well as poets."

Miss La Penotiere's father was the lieutenant in command of His Majesty's ship Schooner Pickle, and on the eve of Trafalgar did useful service in scouting amongst the French fleet. To Penotiere was assigned the honor of bringing home Lord Collingwood's despatches with the tidings of Nelson's victory. Though the bearer of a French name La Penotiere's great grandfather, Col. Frederick La Penotiere, came over with William I, and married Bridget, daughter of the Rev. the Hon. John Fielding, Canon of Salisbury, chaplain to the King, and grand-daughter of Lord Danbrough.

A NEW ENTERPRISE. To Fatten Sheep at Port Arthur. A new industry has lately been started at Port Arthur, that promises extensive developments. A company capitalized at \$50,000 has been organized to fatten sheep for both the Canadian and the British markets on a large scale. They will be fed chiefly on elevator screenings, which can be obtained at from \$4 to \$5 per ton. Those interested in the project are Mr. Jeffrey of St. Paul, who had had experience there in the business, Mr. Finger of the Pigeon River Lumber company, P. L. F. Stratton and R. G. Spofford of Port Arthur. The sheep will be purchased at various points throughout the west, shipped to Port Arthur, and there fed until ready to kill. The company will cater to the local demand as well as supplying markets at a distance. The first shipment of sheep was made last Sunday, when 3,000 were put in to be fed. They were purchased in the west in the Mormon settlement and were shipped from Lethbridge. The barns have a capacity of from 6,000 to 8,000. It is the intention of the company also to purchase hogs for fattening purposes.

A HOUSE OF REFUGE.

Will Locate the Institution in Belleville. Hastings county council has purchased eighty-nine acres of the Henderson property in the eastern limits of Belleville, for the purpose of erecting a House of Refuge. The price to be paid is \$5,500. Madoc and Deseronto were anxious to have the House of Refuge, but Belleville won. Ten-tifiers will be asked for immediately, and work on the building will begin in the spring. The site chosen is beautifully situated on the bay shore, next to the city hospital. Council also granted \$100 to the latter.

His Wife Signed.

Burlington, Dec. 11.—A good story has leaked out in regard to securing names to the local option petition presented to the Burlington council. A resident of the village received a printed circular from the local option party stating that he had signed the petition, and explaining the result at the council meeting. The recipient upon reading it incidentally remarked that "that had not signed any petition, or had never seen one."
