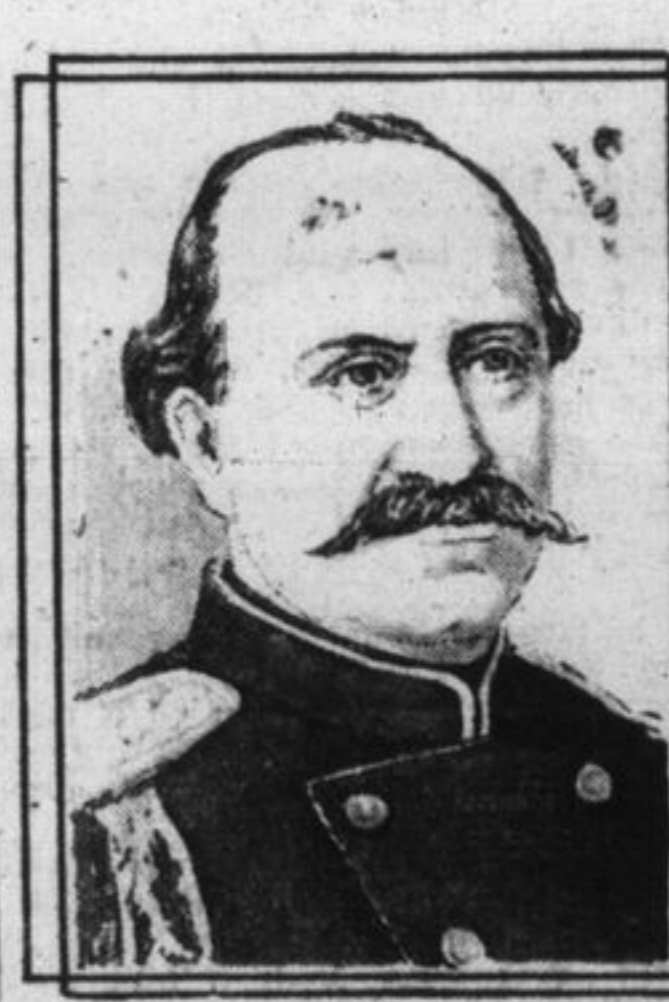

Gen. Thomas S. Allen, veteran of the civil war and pioneer newspaper man of Oshkosh, Wis., is dead, aged eighty years.

The body of Henry Elstone, Woodstock, who died in a fight with Chicago highway robbers, has been brought home for burial.

Work upon the actual construction of the Detroit River tunnel, has been started in the Windsor side of the river for three weeks.

Vincent J. Hughes, secretary of the National Trust company, Montreal, has resigned, and will enter the brokerage of J. H. Dunn & Co.

AID GERMANS

There Are Thousands of Them in Russia.

VERY SAD TALES

ARE TOLD OF THEIR SERIOUS DESTITUTION.

The Germans in Riga Have Organized and Are Ready to Aid Each Other—An Electric Alarm System Has Been Put in Many Houses.

Berlin, Dec. 14.—Prof. Harnack, Von Bergmann, Schumann and Samars, Gen. Von Alten and Von Lebell, Count Von Hell, and numerous other distinguished men have determined to ask the public to contribute to help the German refugees from Russia and the Germans in Russia who desire to leave or who are destitute.

There are about 150,000 German subjects resident in Russia. Some thousands of these have already reached Germany and many more are striving to get back. Distressing stories are told everywhere of their destitution.

The police returns of Berlin show that nearly 100,000 Russians are now here. The families of these men are quite a colony.

An agent from Riga who was at the meeting said the German residents there have organized a regiment, ready by day or night, to defend their own protection and have imported 1,200 Mauser rifles. Many of the Germans live in the same quarter of the town, where their houses adjoin, and they can move from house to house without using the streets.

A system of electrical alarms has been instituted so that at any hour day or night an alarm sounded in one dwelling brings defenders from several other nearby houses. A German could, therefore, leave his family alone in his house with the feeling that his wife has only to sound an electric alarm and numerous armed acquaintances will hurry to her help.

MURDER OR NOTHING?

Said Meredith, Regarding Christian Science Case.

Toronto, Dec. 14.—"It should have been murder or nothing," said Chief Justice Meredith in the court of appeal to-day, when the case of three Christian Scientists, Sarah Goodfellow, Isabelle Grant, and Elizabeth Lee came before that court.

There were convicted with unlawfully conspiring and agreeing with each other to deprive Wallace Goodfellow of the necessities of life, whereby Goodfellow's death was caused, and in the indictment the jury found them guilty of conspiracy. A stated case was granted on these questions: (1) Whether the first count of the indictment should have been quashed, on the ground that, on its face, it disclosed no offence known to law; (2) Whether evidence to show specific cases, effected by Christian Science treatment was properly rejected; (3) Whether the judge should have ruled that there was no duty upon defendants to supply the deceased with medical care, and nursing; (7) Whether the charge was erroneous. The case will last all day.

AFTER TWENTY YEARS

Massachusetts Convict May Receive Tardy Pardon.

Boston, Mass., Dec. 14.—It is among the possibilities that Eugene S. Taylor, whose case attracted much attention at the time of his trial, and who has served twenty years of a life sentence in Charlestown prison, may be released in time to spend Christmas in the outside world.

The crime for which Taylor is imprisoned is the poisoning of his two-year-old son. Taylor admitted purchasing the poison, but denied administering it to his son. He said he intended using it on the crows on his farm. The evidence was wholly circumstantial, but on the advice of his counsel he pleaded guilty.

There has always existed some doubt as to his actual guilt. The first step toward securing his freedom was taken yesterday, when Governor Douglas and his council gave a hearing on the question of granting him a pardon.
