KEEP UP YOUR PAYMENTS

At Least Till After Meeting in January.

The Toronto Telegram gives this advice of an expert to the shareholders of the York County Loan company:

Most decidedly keep up your payments for the present. Payments should be continued at least till after the meeting advertised for January 15th, when the amalgamation proposition will be voted upon. There are only a few more payments to be made before that date, and it would be a pity to jeopardise your claim against the company by defaulting now. Keep up the payments and put all the ones on the company. Those who stop payments will probably find that the company will take advantage of the fact, to the detriment of the shareholders.

The suspension of payments now will only complicate the situation, and tend to depreciate the value of the shares. It is not quite a question of sending good money after bad. The company have a lot of valuable assets. Don't depreciate your claim against the assets by stopping the payments, until the York County Loan company suspends payment. Pay the agent as usual when he calls.
