

SHORTHORN MILK RECORDS.

Forty-Three Cows Produce 362,-147 Pounds. The milk records of Shorthorn cons given by The London Live Stock Journal show that they stand well as milk animals. The herd from which these records were taken consisted of forty-three cows that had calved during 1904, and the total production of milk was 362,147 pounds. Of the forty-three cows eight were first-call heifers. The average per cow was 842 gallons. The greatest number of days in milk was 420, and the small est number was 189 days. The high est number of pounds of milk per day per cow was 41.3 and the lowest 19.7 These cows were Lincoln Red Shorthorns and were registered in the herd book of the Lincoln Red Shorthorn Association.

Worms In Pigs.

Dr. Peters, of the Nebraska experiment station, gives the following di rections for treating worms in pigs; Coal creosote, one ounce; water, ninety-nine ounces. One pint of water weighs sixteen ounces. One ounce of the mixture is the dose for a full grown animal and is best administered with the morning feed. If it is necessary to drench the animal, use a drenching tube made by taking an ordinary tin funnel and a rubber tube three feet long, one-eighth to half an inch in diameter. Insert the lower end of the funnel in this rubber tube, place the rubber tube in the animal's mouth and allow it to bite on it, and pour the drench into the funnel. It is better to place a piece of metal on the end of the rubber tube, so that the animal may bite on it continually without stopping the flow by pinching the rubber tube.
