

Will Oppose Legislation. Chicago, Ill., Dec. 19.—The railroad mployees in every branch of service are determined to oppose the passage of laws in accordance with President Roosevelt's idea of rate legislation. Some time ago the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, the Order of Railcad Conductors, the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, the Brothergood of Locomotive Firemen and the Switchmen's Union, discussed the matter and appointed committees for the purpose of bringing about concerted action on the part of the five large organizations. A committee, composed of representatives of the five organizations will hold a meeting here this afternoon, to discuss the matt nd decide upon some plan of holding mass meeting of railroad employees or the purpose of protesting against the proposed rate legislation. In their opinion such legislation would mean subsequent reduction in wages, and they will make every effort to prevent he passage of such a law.
