LINE IS NO BLUFF

**TORONTO CORNWALL ELEC-
TRIC ROAD PUSHED.**

Representative of the Railway
Talks to Newspaper Concerning
His Plans—Provincial
Charter From Brockville to
Ottawa.

company is called. "About a year and
a half ago I came to Toronto, em-
powered by my backers to buy the
Toronto Railway company. Mr. Mack-
enzie refused to give me a satisfac-
tory answer whether or not he would
be willing to sell the road. Matters
dragged on until November of last
year, when we determined to get a
charter of our own. I interviewed all
the ministers, told them the names of
my backers and what the objects of
the railway would be. All appeared
willing to support my cause and the
charter was allowed to pass.

"Then the Toronto Railway came
out and said it was only a bluff to
induce them to sell their railway. They
held that we would never proceed with
the charter. Now I am just showing
them that my backers mean business.
My offer to the city is summed up in
a few words. We are willing to agree
to build the line within the limits of
Toronto ourselves. But we would rather
have the city build the line them-
selves under a special charter that
could be created by the legislature. In
either case we are willing to allow
the road to be used by the other ra-
dial roads if suitable agreements could
be reached.

"Our charter permits us to build an
electric railway from Cornwall to
Toronto. It also permits the construc-
tion of branch lines running for thirty
miles at right angles to our tracks.
The towns in the district covered by
our line are anxious for us to come
in. In fact we went through the coun-
try last year, and asked them whether
they would subscribe for bonds. In al-
most every instance the township and
town council along the route said
they were willing to do so. However,
I do not think they will be called upon
to subscribe. It was rather done in
order to obtain a true expression of
the opinion of the people.

"Our power will be derived from
falls on the Trent River. This would
be quite sufficient to run our trains at
the rate of forty miles an hour. Be-
tween towns, as we intend to do. Of
course we will run across lots and
have a specific charter permitting us
to cross the G.T.R.

"After we secured our charter, last
year an endeavor was made to have a
bill passed by the legislature prohibi-
ting suburban electric roads running
across lots. This was nonsense. It is
impracticable for runways at the rate
we intend to do everything on the
highway would be killed. The grades
also are too much for high speed. All
classes of traffic will be catered for by
our fast freight, express and passen-
ger. The freight traffic will go through
the country by night, while the ex-
press and passenger traffic will be
handled by day. Special attention will
be paid to the handling of farm and

World's Milk Production.

It is estimated that the total weight
of cows' milk produced in the world is
26,100,000 hundred weight, dis-
tributed as follows: United States,
6,100,000 hundred weight; Russia, 3,
500,000; Germany, 3,000,000; France,
2,000,000; England, 2,000,000; Austria, 1,
700,000; Italy, 1,500,000; Canada, 1,
200,000; Holland, 1,200,000; Sweden
and Norway, 800,000; Switzerland,
700,000; Denmark, 600,000; Australia,
550,000; Spain, 500,000 and Portugal,
500,000. The production of milk in
Europe is 18,450,000 hundred weight
from 45,000,000 cows. The number of
milk cows in the world is 63,800,000
—15,940,000 in the United States and
10,000,000 in Russia. There are only
six head of horned cattle in Spain to
each 23 acres of cultivated land, while
in France there are thirty-four and
in England fifty-six. This shows the poor
conditions of cattle breeding in Spain,
and explains the consequent increase in
the price of butcher's meat for public
consumption.
