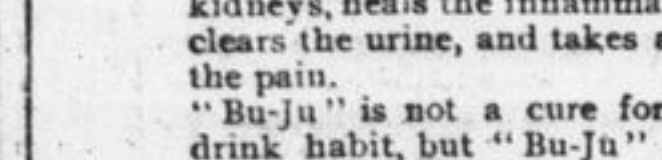

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HOP FOR CONVICT

UNFORESEEN INCIDENT MAY CLEAR CALEB POWERS.

Accused Appeals to Ehler to Disclose the Real Slayer of Governor Coe's Wife. Some Response.

Haverhill, Cal., Dec. 23.—Charles E. Ehler, now in the county hospital suffering from a wound said to be self-inflicted, today, told Superintendent Buckner, of the hospital, that he had information as to the killing of Governor William Goebel, of Kentucky, which, he alleges, would clear Caleb Powers, formerly secretary of state for Kentucky, now under sentence of death for complicity in the killing of Goebel.

A few days ago Powers wrote from Kentucky to Ehler saying: "I see by a press despatch that you may be an important witness in the Goebel case. For six years I have lain in prison, and three times I have been sentenced to death for a crime of which I am as innocent as the angels around the throne. If you have any information that will throw light on the death of Governor Goebel, then for God's sake declare yourself, and aid in proving my innocence."

Ehler said that he could give testimony that might save the life of Powers, but that he would not declare himself fully "because it would implicate others."

MRS. TAYLOR'S GIFT. Offers to Pay Half of City Hospital's Debt.

Watertown, N.Y., Dec. 25.—Mrs. Emma Flower Taylor, who has previously given largely toward the hospital, has notified the trustees that she would make that institution a Christmas present of a sum of money equal to half its standing indebtedness, providing that others would give an equal amount.

There is outstanding against the hospital an indebtedness of \$13,500, and the amount which she proposes to give is \$6,750. In case the amount raised by others should nearly reach this amount Mrs. Taylor will make up the remainder.

An Ottawa footballer who played in first-class company in Canada for over a decade, and who has seen rugby played many times in England during the past twenty years, is of the opinion that the old country scrumming is not such a bad thing as our Canadian asserts that the only difference in the games are in the method of lining up the forwards and the manner in which the backs are interpreted and enforced.

In England the officials are competent and thoroughly conversant with the game. They rule strictly and the players therefore have to conform to the rules or leave themselves open to be blacklisted.

The Ottawa Journal says that the impression has gone abroad that the Stanley cup holders will be weak this year, but the knowing ones who have watched the arrival of the team during the last two weeks hold quite a different opinion.

While the defection of Billy Gilmour and Frank McGee is a serious loss to the team on account of their individual brilliance, still the locals are looking forward to having a better combination than ever on the line.
