Mr. Raley has one rooster for which the dog appears to have a special affinity. When that rooster crows the dog is sure to follow suit. When in the nature of things the rooster is expected to crow, but for some unknown reason fails to do so, the dog starts the game by crowing loud and long and the rooster answers.

The crowing dog is an ordinary fox-hound, but he is worthless for all purposes for which he was bred. In fact, Mr. Raley has never found anything except crowing for which he is well adapted.

Eganville Enterprise. The rumor is in Eganville last spring to the effect that the C. P. SOLD AS DANISH.

Canada Hogs Sold as Danish, United States as Canadian.

Montreal, Dec. 23.—George McGarry, pork-packer, said: "Canada has a perfect right, if disease is feared, to forbid the importation of American hogs. As far as the Canadian market is concerned, the regulation will not have any great effect. This market is ruled by conditions in England, and the law of supply and demand will adjust any difficulty that may arise. As far as the supply is concerned there is no reason why Canada should not raise all the hogs required. Our country is large, the west is opening up rapidly, and a great many more hogs should be raised in the country than are being marketed to-day."

C. W. Bowen, local manager of the Montreal Packing company, said: "The regulation cannot hurt the pork-packing industry in Canada, but it may hurt the individual packers to a certain extent. There are arguments on both sides of the question as to whether harm will result it may encourage the farmers to raise more hogs, as well as ensure a market for all that they can produce, and it may cause a shortage which will put prices of hogs above a paying basis as far as export bacon is concerned."

As for selling poor quality bacon as Canadian Mr. Bowen said that the United States bacon is always being sold as Canadian, and Canadian as Danish, and it would continue to be done.

SHOT CONSTABLE.

Daring Work of Brothers Aboard a Train. Mount Carmel, Ill., Dec. 26.—Two men were killed, a third was probably fatally injured, and every window was shot out of a passenger coach on the Southern railroad last night, when two men in custody for larceny tried to escape by killing a constable. Incidentally twenty-five passengers in the car were kept in bed during the riot for several minutes, the train meantime running at high speed.

When the smoke had cleared away, Constable Onames Kingston and Isaac Marshall, one of the prisoners, were seen to be holding a revolver, the other prisoner, was probably fatally wounded. A bullet passed through the cap of the brakeman, but no one else was harmed.

The Marshall brothers were arrested yesterday on a charge of stealing chickens. They were held for trial, Constable Kingston started for Fairfield with the prisoners. The men in the smoking car were thrown into excitement when one of the Marshall brothers drew a revolver and shot Constable Kingston dead.

Several men in the car drew revolvers and attacked the prisoners. Many shots were fired by the armed passengers, and by the Marshalls. When both prisoners had fallen to the floor the light ceased.

Edward Marshall was taken to Fairfield and placed in jail, with a strong guard to prevent a possible lynching.
