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TO PLAN THE UNION

THERE IS SAID TO BE SUBSTANTIAL UNITY.

Committee of Presbyterians, Methodists and Congregationalists Make Report—Vote of Members to Be Taken Next Year.

Toronto, Ont., Dec. 26.—The final vote by the members of the union of the Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregational churches of Canada in one great committee of three denominations, Friday, cannot be reached before 1904.

"Throughout the whole session," says the official report, "the utmost harmony and brotherly feeling prevailed, all the members apparently being animated by one purpose, namely, to reach conclusions that would be for the glory of their common Lord, and the more rapid extension of His Kingdom throughout the world."

Substantial unity and essential harmony existing among the three denominations in a marked feature of the findings of the committee. The common doctrines held by the Presbyterians, Methodists and Congregationalists are formulated.

Possible lines for framing a policy for the united church, the arrangements of pastoral service without a time limit, settlement and transfers of pastors, training for the ministry, and the relations of a minister to the doctrine of the church are set forth, and the matter of administration is left in the hands of a sub-committee to prepare a detailed report for the next annual meeting of the general conference.

The delicate question of the relation of the minister to the doctrine of the united church is decided. The candidate for ordination must believe himself a child of God, truly called to the ministry, must hold the holy scriptures as containing sufficiently all doctrines necessary to salvation and be resolved to teach nothing not in conformity with them. He must believe the doctrines of the "United Church," as he understands it, to be agreeable to the will of the Lord, and his adherence being pledged to it.

The committee then proceed to set out in fifteen articles the various doctrinal points of the agreement. The law of God, as revealed in the Scriptures, is described as a visible and sacred brotherhood, consisting of those who profess faith in Jesus Christ and obedience to him with their children.

Baptism and the Lord's supper are two sacraments. Baptism is not stated to be by sprinkling or immersion. A minister is declared to be according to the Lord's will, and that the church should not contain unworthy members. Belief in the resurrection of the just and unjust is declared.

The report is signed by Chancellor of the Exchequer, the Rev. Dr. H. W. Ramsay for the Presbyterians, and the Rev. T. B. Hyde for the Congregationalists.

TOO SICK TO WORK.

Sad State of An Apprentice in Montreal.

Montreal, Dec. 27.—An incident in the recorder's court, revealed a sad state of things. The case was that of a lad named Monette, who was charged with non-fulfillment of an apprenticeship in a cigar factory. The charge was preferred by the foreman of the factory and the lad's stepfather appeared in support of it. He had appeared in court before on the same charge, and the complainants still urged that laziness was the cause of his breach of contract. Recorder Weir thought the youth's appearance before the court, so he ordered a physical examination. The doctor reported as follows: "The boy is scrofulous, anemic, is subject to palpitation of the heart, and that organ has a very indolent action; he should give up the cigar-making business at once and seek some outdoor employment, as tuberculosis is strongly marked; he is short-sighted and is suffering from vertigo."

The recorder considered the report horrifying. He dismissed the action, at the same time observing that, while discipline was a necessity in factories, health should not be overlooked, and he thought it was a grave matter for the authorities to realize the actual and possible issue of such an example.

SEVERAL DEATHS

Of Farmer Residents of Lennox County.

Napanee, Dec. 27.—The many friends of Mrs. Heyner, formerly Mrs. G. O. Johnston, of Ernestown Station, will be pained to hear of her death which occurred about a week ago at Uniontown, Pa., after a brief illness.

The commencement of her illness was obscure, which developed into pneumonia and from this other complications followed, and the immediate cause of her death was due to Bright's disease. Deceased was well-known and beloved by all with whom she was acquainted. She was of a bright, cheerful disposition and when she left here but four short months ago she was the picture of perfect health. Her only son, R. A. Johnston, C.P.R. agent at Apple Hill, was summoned when she became ill and was with her to the last. The remains were brought to Ernestown Station, last Friday, and the remains placed in the vault for interment later. Her husband and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Nicholas Amey, Ernestown, have the sympathy of a host of friends in their bereavement.
