The Irish party has decided to op-
 pose Mr. Healy when he seeks re-elec-
 tion for North Louth.

James Burke was murdered at Otta-
 wa, while attempting to force his
 way into a drinking den.

Dr. Baron Mumm Von Schwartz-
 stein, the German minister at Pekin,
 has been appointed ambassador of
 Germany at Tokio.

At Paducah, Ky., Mrs. Vella Ghol-
 son, the widow of a prominent farm-
 er, shot and killed William Fryer in a
 dispute over a tree.

The United States commission of men of
 high degree to study American political
 and military, naval, educational
 and industrial methods.

Elliott Gtonley, employed by the
 Imperial Cotton company, Hamilton,
 accompanied by his sister, was struck
 by a Grand Trunk train and instantly
 killed.

In Ireland where labor candidates

 ring Strait. The cost, as it is esti-
 mated would be \$250,000,000.

The Russian synod will appoint a
 committee of its clergy to meet a
 similar committee of Protestant Epis-
 copal churches to obtain a clearer
 interpretation of the common prayer
 book.

At New London, Conn., Emma Dur-
 and, a cook, was burned to death.
 Mrs. Pierson, a boarder, was thrown
 from a window on the second floor
 by an explosion of gasoline and seriously
 injured.

Van A. Wilcox has arrived at Los
 Angeles, Cal., on the home stretch of
 his tramp from the Atlantic to the
 Pacific, having walked just 165 days
 since leaving New York. His average
 was a little more than twenty-two
 miles a day.

The Union Steamship company will
 be operated in connection with the
 Union Oil company. The capital stock
 is \$5,000,000. The company will run
 between Pacific coast ports and Pana-
 ma and the Orient, and also run
 steamers between Colon and Europe.

Prison Finder Twine.

The binding-twine plant at Kansas
 penitentiary is, says a correspondent
 of Country Gentleman, to be enlarged
 to six times its present capacity. An-
 nual consumption of twine in Kansas
 is about 20,000,000 pounds. Of this
 the prison plant supplies only 3,000,
 000 pounds. The twine trade is re-
 mainder. For the work \$60,000 is
 available, earned the past season by
 the plant. In Minnesota the prison
 plant pays all the expenses of the
 penitentiary. That state used about 17,
 000,000 pounds of twine annually, of
 which the plant furnishes 11,000,000
 pounds. When the Kansas plant is
 enlarged, the board will employ trav-
 elling men to canvass the state and
 will sell all on time, as the state has
 done.

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
