The fourth step, the catarrh begins to spread from the throat, then to the bronchial tubes, and finally into the lungs. It is then consumption in the first stage.

VERY SUDDEN CALL

JOHN H. WHELAN, WESTPORT POSTMASTER, DIED.

Was Ill But Ten Minutes When Death Ensued—Deceased Was Third Post Master of Westport—Prominent in Municipal Politics and Clerk of North Crosby.

Brookville Recorder. Brookville was shocked Friday, on learning of the death of one of the best known men in Leeds county. The reference is made to John H. Whelan, postmaster of Westport. Only a few days ago Mr. Whelan had appeared at the office in good health.

The late Mr. Whelan was married three times, and is survived by his last wife, who was Miss Lynett. He is also survived by nine children. They are: Mrs. Donnelly, and Miss Tessie, of Toronto; Mrs. Williams and Miss Lena, of Garden Island; Misses Alice, Marie, Anna, and Messrs. Walter Francis and James, all of Westport. He is also survived by two brothers and two sisters. They are McCaffrey, Westport; Mrs. McKay, Saginaw, Mich., and Messrs. William, of Detroit, and James of Sandwich.

FIVE GOLDEN RULES.
