tually agreed as follows: This agreement shall be signed by each candidate and at least one hundred and fifty of his supporters who shall be selected and named in writing by or on behalf of the opposite candi date. When satisfactorily signed shall be marked approved by each candidate and then become operative. The supporters of each candidate who sign this agreement are hereby acknowledged by each candidate as his agents within the meaning of the Ontario election act for purposes of this

The parties signing this agreement bind themselves . in honor and good faith to absolutely refrain from and prevent as far as they can any infraction of the Ontario election law, among which infractions are:

1.-The bribing of voters by money or other valuable consideration or

2.—The procuring or promising of fice, place or employment for voters or the unduly influencing them; 3.-The subscribing, advancing or paying money for the purposes of election, except the moneys bona fide, paid into the hands of the financial agent of the candidate, such agent to to the inspection of any party sign-

ing this agreement: 4.-The corruptly treating or furnshing entertainment to voters: 5.-The corruptly betting or wagering on the election; 6.—The hiring of vehicles to convey electors to the poll or the paying of

travelling expenses of voters; 7.- The personation of voters. The said parties hereto undertake that they have not been guilty of or privy to any such infraction in peet of this election.
