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TRIALS OF HEIRESS

VASSAR GIRL TELLS OF HER FIGHT TO MAKE A LIVING

Too Much Bluing in Wash—Studies Cook Book and is Happy Because She is Now a Model Domestic.

Pittsburg, Jan. 12.—Miss Kathryn Gray, the Vassar girl, who has been working as a domestic here, will go to Washington the first of next week to claim the fortune of about \$500,000, which has been kept away from her for more than half a century. Miss Gray will be accompanied by Marcus W. Acheson, Jr., an attorney of Pittsburg, who has been retained to look after her interests.

Miss Gray was to have met her uncle, John Gray, of Richmond, Va., with whom she spent almost all of her life as his ward, at the Willard hotel, in Washington, this afternoon. Mr. Gray is the Willard, and, according to letters which he wrote his niece, was ready to turn over to her the fortune left by his father immediately upon her arrival. Upon advice of her attorney, Miss Gray decided not to go to Washington to-day.

Miss Gray was here this afternoon at the home of E. W. Bausman, where she has been employed for the last four months, and where she is still working as a domestic. Clad in a blue mess apron, it was she who opened the door.

"Yes, I am still working," she laughingly replied. "You see I have been working for me for the last seven years, and now that I am to receive my fortune, I cannot break off at all. I will keep on working here every day until next week, when I will go to Washington to meet my Uncle Jack and get my money."

"It's a strange story, and now that it is about to end so happily, I feel like laughing at all the troubles I had. I was only an infant when my mother died, and almost immediately after her death my father, ex-Senator Asbury Gray, of Virginia, went to California, where he died seven years later. I never saw him except when they brought the body home. When I grew older I was told that my father had left me a fortune, but that it had been lost. That was all I ever knew."

"I had always lived with my uncle John Gray, at Richmond, and was treated as his child. It was he who gave me money to go to school, and to otherwise educate me. I had never worked a day in my life when I returned from college and met the ultimatum of marrying my uncle's old friend or leaving his house. I refused to marry him and was forced to leave. That was seven years ago."

"I went to Philadelphia, where for a time I lived with my aunt, Mrs. Joseph Johnston, of North Fifteenth street, and afterward with another aunt, Mrs. Benjamin Johnston, at Swarthmore. I had an income of \$25 a month, but that would not keep me, and I knew I would have to go to work."

"No one will ever realize what it means for a young woman to look for work who has never been accustomed to work. I made the rounds of every store in Philadelphia, asking for employment. Always the first question that was put to me was whether I had reference from my last employer. I could not furnish them, and that ended it."

"Thoroughly disheartened, I decided that the only thing that was left for me to do was to try to get a job as a domestic. I didn't want to do so in Philadelphia, and so I went to New York, where I procured a place as a waitress. Three weeks of such work almost drove me crazy, and I returned to Philadelphia, without letting them know where I had been."

"About this time I learned that my uncle Jack had discovered my whereabouts. Believing that he was still after me, he came to New York, and took the first train for Pittsburg. I knew no one here, and that was why I came."

Use Whitewash. Whitewash is a good thing for the farmer to use around his farm buildings. It is a good disinfectant and makes things look brighter and neater. Before winter sets in the inside of cow and horse stalls should be given a good coat of this material. The best way to put it in is with a spraying apparatus, the same as used for spraying fruit trees. The whitewash should not be made too thick, and it can be put on very evenly. In the chicken house is a good place to use this mixture as it will help keep out lice and disease.

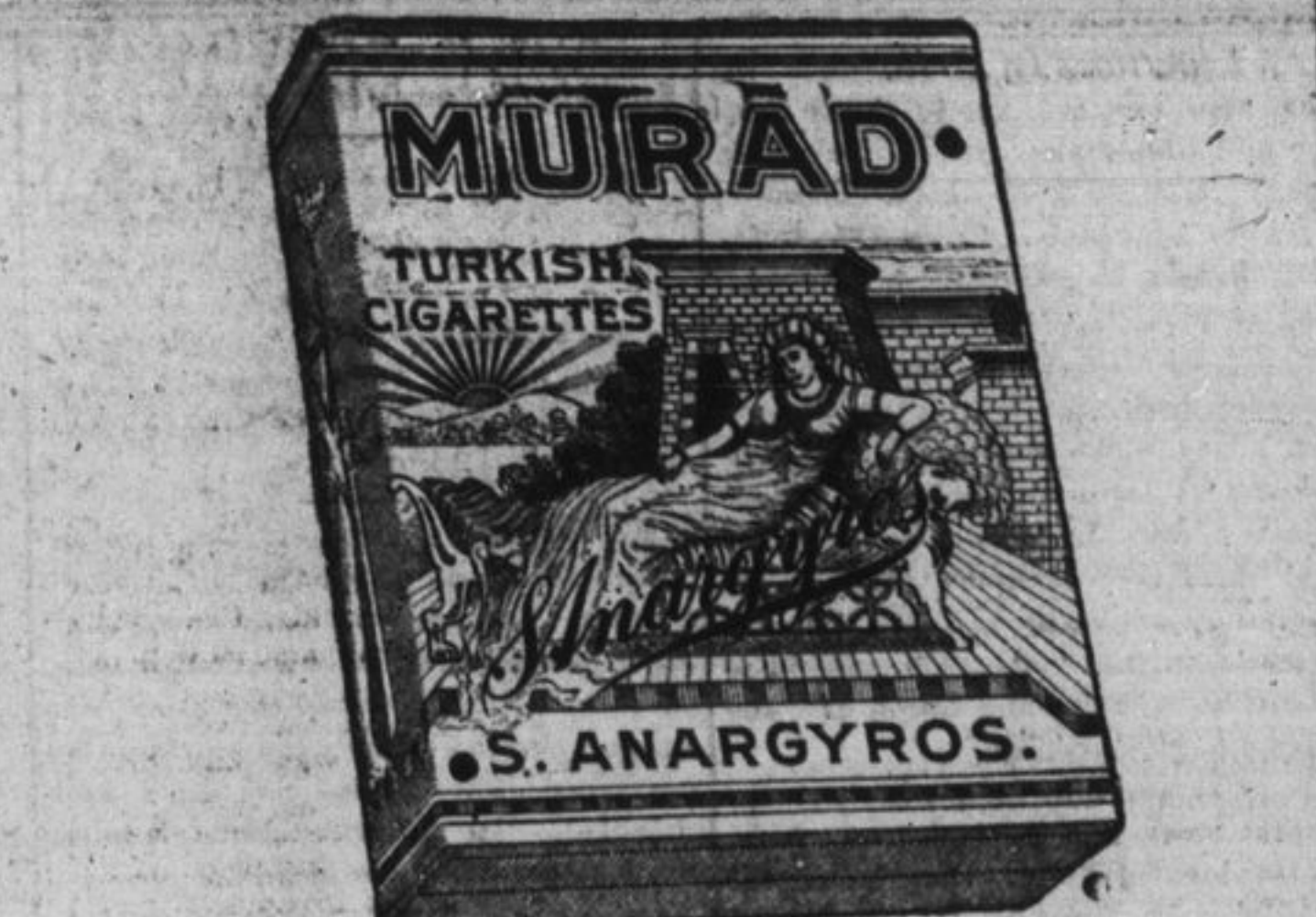
Use Quicklime for making the white wash. Pour water over the lime and let it slack. Add enough water to the slacked lime to make the wash of the proper consistency and it is ready to use. Some claim that the addition of salt adds to its adhesive qualities. If the wash is to be used in a sprayer it should be strained through burlap or some coarse cloth before using, or it will clog the sprayer.
