**GREAT SWEEP**  
Overpowering Liberal Majorities Given.

**TWO CANADIANS IN**  
SIR GILBERT PARKER, AND HAMAR GREENWOOD.

**Balfour Defeated, Winston Churchill Triumphant—Majority of 34,090 Against Conservatives—Voting Covered Forty Seats—Labor Goes Freely With Liberals.**  
London, Jan. 15.—Mr. Balfour defeated, Winston Churchill triumphant, and twenty-one out of twenty-six seats taken from the conservatives, are the great governing facts of the liberal free trade sweep, with which the polling began on Saturday. The figures are even more astounding, for not only did the conservatives fail to gain a single seat to offset their repeated losses, but they started, in twenty-one ridings, with majorities aggregating 17,369 in their favor. They finished with majorities aggregating 34,090 against them. The voting covered forty seats. The result analyzed shows that the conservatives retained only five out of twenty-six seats. The liberals added seven.

**BALFOUR BEATEN.**  
London, Jan. 15.—A. J. Balfour, the former prime minister, running in the conservative interest, was defeated in the election for member of parliament for the east division of Manchester by T. G. Hordridge, liberal and free trader. The liberal majority was 1,980.

**TO STOP WASTE.**  
To Protect the Timber on Crown Lands.  
Ottawa, Jan. 15.—As a result of the attention that the prime minister has been devoting to the question of forestry, measures will be taken without delay to prevent the wasteful destruction of timber on all crown lands held by the federal authorities. The only lands that the dominion still controls are situated in the new provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta, and the premier is determined that no more of the woodlands of those regions shall be alienated. Moreover, it is possible that some acres that had been sold will be bought back by the crown and, with a few exceptions, that no more timber shall be taken than is required for the actual needs of the settlers. Even this will only be sanctioned under regulations of the scanty forest, the continuance of which will ensure that the plains possess. It has been clearly shown that conservation of the forest growth on the eastern slope of the shields of Alberta and Saskatchewan are absolutely essential to the retention of a sufficient water supply for the prairie region. This consideration will fully justify the government in any restrictive measures that it decides to take.

**A YOUNG SWEDEN**  
Being Operated on for South African Bute.  
Montreal, Jan. 15.—Frederick Herst, a young Swede, is today undergoing an operation in the Royal Victoria hospital. A piece of shell re-embedded in his forehead, and was removed from his side. All last week he refused to be operated upon, because he was under indictment for alleged theft, but on Saturday afternoon a sensation when it was learned that he was a victim of a party fight, Parker's, on a street in North-West Manchester, where he had a three-corner fight, with the result thus: Parker, 3,102; Geary, 2,133; Macpherson, labor, 873. At the election, on January 13th, the average liberal majority being 1,635.

**FATAL TRAIN WRECK.**  
Brakeman Dead and Four Others Injured.  
Syracuse, N.Y., Jan. 15.—A fatal freight wreck occurred on the Rome, Watertown & Ogdensburg division of the New York Central railway at this city, as a result of which Edwin Parish, of Oswego, a brakeman, is dead, and four other members of the crew, all from Oswego, are injured. Engineer William Nolan has a fractured skull and a dislocated hip, and is seriously hurt. Flagman Charles Eddowes had a bruised hip. The freight train bound north ran into an engine and caboose which was backing towards this city.

**NOT SO BAD AFTER ALL.**  
Still Able to House Considerable Guests.  
Montreal, Jan. 15.—Upwards of 130 guests are given accommodation in the Windsor. Hereafter 260 will easily be accommodated. So far the hotel has not been able to supply any of the guests with meals, but board directors at a meeting this morning considered a plan to establish a temporary dining room in the Windsor hall. The damage was confined almost entirely to one section of the building, which can easily be shut off. Insurance men estimate the loss at \$200,000.

**Speeches To Laborers.**  
London, Jan. 15.—Lady Warwick, the court beauty, known as the "democratic countess," took a hand in the election struggle, addressing her "conrades and friends," the dock laborers of West Ham, in support of their candidate, Will Thorne. The countess, in a dainty evening costume, braved the bleak wind while, as a tradesman's wagon she urged the laborers to work to secure an independent labor party in the House of Commons. She assured that she was convinced of the ultimate victory of the democratic movement and prophesied that the new government would not last longer than eight months.

**Grand Entry Into Tokio—Enthusiastically Cheered.**  
Tokyo, Jan. 15.—Gen. Oku, who commanded the last army during the war with Russia, made a triumphal entry into the capital. The general, who was accompanied by his staff, drove in the imperial carriage to the palace. The greatest enthusiasm was manifested by the people who lined the route, cries of "Banshun" and "Ging" greeting the general who isolated Port Arthur at a critical stage of the campaign.

**Three Big Tax Bills Owing.**  
Belleville, Jan. 15.—Alderman Marsh, chairman of the executive committee of the city council, has addressed a letter to the papers, stating that three tax rolls are now outstanding, the total amount owed the city being over \$46,000. The threat is made that, if settlement is not at once made the city will issue warrants against the delinquents.

**The United States government** has returned \$6, illegally collected income taxes from officers of H.M.S. Drake, at Niagara Falls, N.Y., last summer.

**A CRUEL CRIME**  
Passion Of Man Led To Murder.

**HE STRANGLED HER**  
CONCEALED AND LATER DISCOVERED THE BODY.

**Richard Ivins Admitted That He Tried to Assault the Woman and Then Killed Her by Twisting a Copper Wire About Her Neck.**  
Chicago, Jan. 15.—The dead body of Mrs. Beattie Hollister, wife of Franklin C. Hollister, a member of the printing firm of Hollister Bros., one of the largest of its kind in the city, was found Saturday morning lying on a pile of stable refuse in the rear of the residence of Edward Ivins, at 368 Belden avenue. A few hours later Richard Ivins, who reported the case to the police, confessed to the police that he had murdered the woman after attempting to assault her. Mrs. Hollister had been strangled to death by a copper wire, which had been twisted about her neck. The wire had been insulated, but the insulation had been removed. The wire had been caught just under the chin by the seal skin collar worn by Mrs. Hollister, but in the back it had been brought

An auditorium after plans prepared by President Harper and centrally situated on the university campus, built with funds contributed by friends of Dr. Harper and by the university, will stand as the central edifice of the institution.
