GOVERNMENT AID

ASKED FOR TO SEND EIGHT TO HENLEY.

London Petitioners for Government School of Hygiene—Possibility of Its Establishment—Money—Lenders Want Books Returned, and Warrants Withdrawn.

Paris, Jan. 17.—The national assembly met, this morning, at eleven o'clock, in the Congress hall of the royal palace, Versailles, for the election of a president of the republic.

Vienna, Jan. 17.—Two tourists, who were spending a holiday at Arco, climbed Mount St. Elias, 1,000 feet high, and when they reached the last path met a poodle dog, which barked and moaned pitifully.

To Dethrone King Peter. Budapest, Jan. 17.—A despatch to the Heralds from Belgrade says that military and political conspiracy has been discovered to dethrone King Peter and to elect Prince Joachim, the sixth son of Emperor William, King of Serbia, in his stead.

Diamond Wedding. Cornwall, Jan. 17.—Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Kyle, North Winchester, recently celebrated their diamond wedding. Both were born in county Antrim, Ireland, and came to Canada in their childhood.

Boom For Free Coal. Montreal, Jan. 17.—There is an evident intention on the part of Mr. Whitney to start a free coal station in Canada, and it is understood that the movement will have the support of the Halifax Chronicle, the St. John Sun, and a new daily, that is also to be started in Gloucester Bay, C.B., to boom the cause.

A Great Influx. Winnipeg, Jan. 17.—It is expected that the number of immigrants to come to Canada during 1906, will total 200,000, according to the estimate of immigration officials in close touch with the movement. Of these it is calculated that 75,000 will be Americans, farmers mostly.

Last night there was an unusually large turnout for rifle practice at the Armois, with "A" and "B" companies. The shooting at the fifty yard mark was commented upon as being particularly good. The contestants are held right to the end of the shooting, and attract a large number of spectators.

DEATH OF MRS. LAIDLAW.

She Passed Away in Montreal, on Tuesday.

Mrs. Laidlaw, widow of the late John Laidlaw, dry goods merchant of Kingston, died, on Tuesday, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Leslie, Montreal. Deceased was born in Quebec province, and married to Mr. Laidlaw, in Montreal, where the latter was in the dry goods business. About 1885, the family came to Kingston. Mr. Laidlaw establishing himself in business here, a business which has grown four-fold. In the spring of 1902 occurred the death of Mr. Laidlaw. For the past three years Mrs. Laidlaw resided with her daughter, Mrs. Leslie, in Montreal. She was a woman of many good qualities, cultured and gracious. She was always ready to assist in all good work, and was esteemed by all her friends and neighbors. During her long residence in Kingston, she was one of the leading workers in Chalmers church congregation.

The Late Mrs. Ash. This morning Henrietta Ann Harding, wife of J. B. Ash, 49 Arch street, passed away after an illness of diabetes, extending over four months. Deceased was aged forty years and eleven months. Surviving are her husband, caretaker of Queen's medical college; two sons, Dr. A. F. Ash, Duke's Centre, Pa., and Clyde B. Ash, Rochester, N.Y.; and one daughter, Effie, at home. Mrs. Ash was a member of Queen street Methodist church, and a lady much esteemed. Very sincere sympathy is extended to the bereaved family.

OCCURRENCES RECOUNTED IN BRIEF FORM.

Matters That Interest Everybody—Notes From All Over—Little Of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

The Toronto police are asking for increased pay. The Ingersoll Electric Power and Light company have been awarded the town's lighting contract. Mrs. David King is suing the Toronto railway company for damages for the death of her husband.

The contract for the new process of manufacture and agricultural implement building at the Toronto Exhibition was awarded to C. R. S. Dennis, for \$2,100,000. A special from Russellville, Ark., says that fire which broke out there last night, wiped out the entire business district and entailed an aggregate loss of \$300,000.

A Man of Honor. Choose a speckled cigar and you can't go wrong." The speaker was a skate salesman. The tobacco salesman laughed at him. "Are you a victim of that error, too?" he said. "Listen and I'll tell you all about those little yellow specks." "We are in Cuba. In mile-long rows grow the tobacco plants in a blinding sunlight. Suddenly the sky is overcast, a shower falls, then the clouds disappear and the sun shines again upon plants dotted here and there with immense raindrops—raindrops peculiar to Cuba, as large as the largest pearls. "These drops become burning in the sunlight. The same as real lenses they concentrate the sun's heat and on the leaf beneath them the little specks that you venerate, are burnt. These little yellow specks indicate the tobacco's quality no more than freckles on a man's nose indicate his ability. "To choose cigars by their specks is as foolish as it would be to choose salesmen by their freckles."
