**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS**

Any one numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not being so constituted upon by any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years of age, or 100 acres or more, may be obtained on the following conditions:

(1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) If the settler or his wife, if the latter is deceased, of any person who is eligible to make a homestead claim, under the provisions of this Act, resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land intended for each person as a homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence may be satisfied by each person residing with his father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the homestead.

APPLICATION FOR PATENT should be made at the end of three years, before the Local Agent, Sub-Agent or the Homestead Inspector.

Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention to do so.

**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING REGULATIONS.**

Claims may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soil coal and \$20 for anthracite. Not more than 320 acres can be acquired by one individual or company. Royalty at the rate of ten cents per ton of coal mined shall be collected as the gross output.

Quartz.—A free miner's certificate is granted upon payment in advance of \$7.50 per annum for an individual, and from \$10 to \$100 per annum for a company according to capital.

A free miner, having discovered mineral in place, may locate a claim 1,500 ft.

The fee for recording a claim is \$5. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. When \$200 has been expended or paid, the locator may, upon having survey made, and upon complying with the requirements, purchase the land at \$1 an acre.

PLACER mining claims are generally 100 feet square, and cost \$5, renewable yearly.

A free miner may obtain two leases to a tract of five miles each for a term of twenty years, renewable at the discretion of the locator. The interior lease shall have a dredge in operation within one mile of the claim. The lease for each five miles. Rental, \$10 per annum for each mile of river leased. Royalty at the rate of 12 per cent collected on the output after it exceeds \$10,000.

**HONEY QUESTION**

THE EXPERTS STILL KEEP CHEERFULLY AT IT.

Mr. Bridge Talks About Granulated Honey—Says it is Pure—Honey Cured by Sting of Bees—Another Letter.

Kingston, Jan. 18.—(To the Editor.) I find that a large number of people not posted in working with honey, suppose that honey that is granulated has been adulterated with sugar, but such is not the case. However, it is a sure sign of its purity. Honey that has been adulterated after being extracted from the combs, will not granulate. It is impossible to keep honey from granulating after it has been extracted from the combs, unless it is kept in a room where the thermometer will register ninety degrees. Just as soon as the weather begins to get cool, in the fall of the year, honey begins to get thick, and before winter sets in it will be granulated solid.

The proper way to melt it is to put the tin in a pan of water, and put on the stove in a place where the water will not boil. The water must be kept warm, but not boiling. If the honey is kept too hot in melting it will turn a red color. It will not spoil the honey, but it will spoil the color of it considerably. When the color of honey has been changed by over heating, it should be taken off the stove soon after it is melted.

The question has often been asked me, "Will it granulate the second time?" Yes, it will, if not kept in a warm room, but it will not granulate the second time as soon as it does the first time. Honey should never be put in a cellar. It will be sure to spoil if kept in a cold, damp place. It will stand any amount of cold if kept in a dry place. I have honey ten years old in sealers. It has been kept in the loft of a building, winter and summer, where it has been exposed to the freezing air below zero, and all the heat of the ten summer seasons, and is as nice now as it was the day it was put up.

Bees cure their honey with their stings. When they are kept in the flowers it is very thin, and will run as free as water, and is not ready for being sealed over; it takes eight or ten days for the bees to evaporate the honey after it is put in the cells, and when it is thoroughly evaporated they seal it over with wax. Before the sealing is done the bees touch the honey in each cell, with the point of their stings. This stinging has a small poison bag attached to it, and a very small quantity of the acid in the poison bag goes into each cell, and cures the honey. This fact has been satisfactorily proved first by seeing the bees go through the operation in observing bives; second, by a stingless bee, D. A. Jones, Boston, Ont., has been all over the world where there are any bees, and has brought every kind of bees that is to be found anywhere in Canada, and among the different strains was one without a sting. The honey from these bees would not keep in any temperature, cold or hot, and this has given the bee-keepers satisfactory proof that bees use their stings to cure their honey.—A. BRIDGE.

**THE GENTLE ART**

Of Dynamiting—Bombs and Bomb Throwers.

The gentle art of dynamiting, the increasing number of bombs political and bombs personal, are phrases of current life more than passing importance. Alfonso of Spain, the emperor of Turkey and less recently and more frantically the Grand Duke Sergei have all within a year served as targets for the infernal machine. **THE COBALT DISTRICT.**

Need of Smelter is Felt, Says Mr. Jay.

"The crying need of the province especially of the Cobalt district, is a smelter," said S. T. Jay, formerly of Wolfe Island, but now of New Lisleshire, when seen today. "The government should help to establish one. I have not seen the Cobalt district since I left the ore to be refined in New York and lose all the other substances but the silver, which is a great loss to Canada."

Mr. Jay is on a week's visit to city friends. He has been in the new district for two years with his family and is engaged in "phone and telegraph construction work." The more he sees of the country, the better he likes it, he declared. He thinks it is a great district, good farm and timber land, needing only the man to go in and redeem it. Just now there is but little prospecting, but a great bonanza is looked for in the Cobalt. The place in which Mr. Jay resides, New Lisleshire, has a population of 2,500 and a floating population of about the same number. They have two line hotels and a new one being erected at a cost of \$50,000. A handsome new school is being built, costing \$60,000. It already has a first-class skating and a \$5,000 skating rink.

Speaking of the winter he has been enjoying Mr. Jay said the coldest it had been as yet was twenty-two degrees below zero, but the air is so clear and calm, that the cold is hardly felt. At present there is about fifteen feet of snow and it is grand sleighing.
