NEW STUDIO OPENED.

Woman's Art Association Has New Home.

On Thursday afternoon, the new studio of the Kingston Art Association in the Y.W.C.A. building, was formally opened by Mrs. Dignam, president of the association.

The studio has a good light, is well fitted up, and contains casts used in the late Kingston Art School, kindly secured for it by Miss Gildersleeve, first vice-president, and last year president of the association.

It was a cause of much regret that Miss Gildersleeve was unavoidably absent from the opening, and the members felt deep sympathy with her in the recent family bereavement.

After a cup of tea, and conversation Mrs. Dignam addressed a meeting of the association, including some additions to their number. She gave a resume of the aims of the general association, in stimulating an intelligent love of art, and cultivation of taste among our people, and encouraging the development of design and execution in industrial arts, more particularly such as women may be able to prosecute at home, lace-making, book-binding, the manufacture of home-woven stuffs, etc.

She also made suggestions regarding the study of art literature, illustrated by photographs, among the members of the association, which it is hoped will be carried out.

Miss Machar, president of the local association, proposed a vote of thanks to Mrs. Dignam, and also to Miss Drummond, for the trouble she had taken both with regard to the exhibition and the present meeting.

A deserved tribute was also paid to Mrs. Nash, so long the efficient secretary-treasurer, who has been so ably succeeded by Miss Drummond.
