Miss Emma Johnson, Pieton, sold her fine residence to D. B. Cole, Green Point.

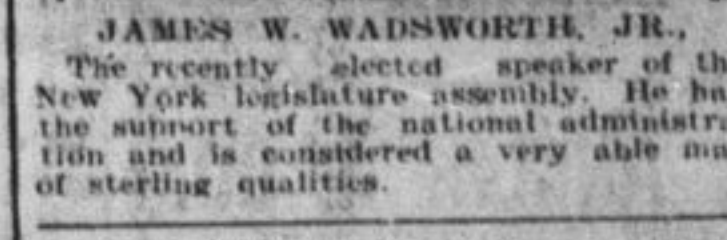
The Point Petre lighthouse closed its seventy-second year of lighting with 1905.

SCHOOL SAVINGS BANKS.

The Matter Discussed as to Their Benefits.

It is learned that the board of education, Belleville, will establish school savings banks. Inspector Kidd was asked this morning as to the advisability of following the scheme in the city public schools. Though somewhat non-committal in the matter he said he thought it would be a good matter for the board to discuss. Some time ago the matter came up, locally, but nothing resulted. School savings banks have been run successfully in many of the cities in the United States, but have received little attention in Canada. Many think they are important factors in teaching the children the value of money, economy, thrift and the habit of saving. The children can deposit to their credit as little as one cent, and the offices of these banks are usually filled by pupils of the senior classes. It is also a practical lesson in mathematics for the higher scholars. The principal and school children serve as auditors. But the one trouble attached is that in a measure the trustees are held responsible for the success of the undertaking and thus do not wish to undertake the responsibility.

Speaking on the question to-day, a prominent man with a deep interest in our public schools' welfare said: "The trouble is there are to-day too many trustees made, in our schools, on the three R's."

QUESTIONABLE MERIT. The Whitney Government and Its Dismissals.

Toronto Star. One thing the Whitney government has done will prove questionable merit. By dismissing all the license inspectors at one sweep on the plea that such officials must necessarily be in harmony with the party in power, a principle is established that will inevitably be followed when next there is a change of government. When the liberals regain office there will be another clean sweep, so that these officers will be "in harmony" with the change. Does anybody suppose that the present inspectors, knowing with absolute certainty that the defeat of their party means their own dismissal, will sit back and not make a bundle to save themselves? They will hustle—make sure of that. Partisanship is offensive when it is in opposition to those in authority. This is one thing for which the province, in the end, will not thank the Whitney government.

OUR FISH AND GAME COMMUNICATION FROM AN ASSOCIATION.

Headquarters in Toronto, and Branches Throughout the Province—Report Will be Submitted to Minister of Public Works.

Ottawa, Jan. 10th, 1906. Mr. Chairman and Members of The Ontario Game Commission.

On the invitation of the minister of public works, invited also by yourself, sir, and for both courtesies we tender our best thanks, I, as secretary, and U. Adams, as secretary of the extension committee, of the Toronto branch of the Ontario Fish and Game Protective Association, take much pleasure in being present and in having had the opportunity of listening to your interesting discussion. You will pardon us, however, if we take no part in the proceedings of this meeting, and in explaining our reasons for not doing so we may perhaps give some impression which may be of interest to the commission and to the public.

Representing as we do only the Toronto branch, which is the headquarters of the association, our branches throughout the province might naturally feel that we were exceeding our authority if we were to express opinions on any questions before this commission. Yet we should like to explain briefly to the commission a feature of the association which has a bearing on the subjects under discussion. The association is composed of a headquarters branch in Toronto, together with branches throughout the province. The constitution provides for a convention meeting, to be held when the exhibition is in progress at Toronto, in September, to be composed of delegates from each branch. Judging from the number of branches already formed, and those now in progress of formation, we confidently expect by June next to have at least twenty-five such branches in various parts of the province, from Sudbury and Sturgeon Falls in the north, already formed, to Windsor in the south, now in process of formation. Some time about June the Toronto branch will take upon itself the responsibility of sending to the branches a list of subjects on which considerable divergence of opinion exists, subjects such as are now

before you, with the request that each branch will hold meetings to discuss the same. The result will be that the delegates will come to the convention meeting fully instructed on the views of the branches they severally represent. At this meeting all questions raised by the delegates will be thoroughly and sympathetically considered, and a report will be drawn up setting forth in detail all matters decided upon.

Recommendations, too, we hope, as these now exist, and also as to the method by which they are now enforced. This report will be submitted to you, Mr. Chairman, and to the minister of public works. The association trusts that this report will be received in the same spirit in which it will be tendered. It will be tendered wholly and solely in the interests of the better protection of fish and game. We respectfully submit, that in the organization we have formed and are extending, the government and the game commission will find a valuable and willing auxiliary to aid them in anything they may propose to do for the good of the province. We do respectfully submit that this association, organized, be it said, quite disinterestedly, and at some cost to its members, will provide a means of learning the opinions which neither the game commission, nor persists any government could, under existing conditions, otherwise obtain.

The association confidently looks forward to the time when, with the hearty co-operation of its branches, and the kindly sympathy of government, the people of this province, and indeed of the country at large, will be brought to realize the potential wealth inherent in our fish and game, and will gradually make of them, not only an abundant source of legitimate

report, but also an equally abundant source of equally legitimate revenue.
