**A LITTLE RIFT**

In The Conservative Cloud  
Of Gloom.

**TWO SCOTTISH WINS**

GILBERT PARKER WON'T GIVE  
GRAVES END TO BALFOUR.

Persistent Rumor That Balfour  
Will Go to the Lords—Lloyd-  
George and Harcourt Returned—  
Liberal Seats Number 247.

SIR HENRY H. FOWLER,  
Executive of state for India, who  
has been made chancellor of the duchy  
of Lancaster in the new British cabinet.  
London, Jan. 22.—Saturday night's  
returns included two conservative  
gains, both scored in Scotland. In  
St. Andrew's borough a liberal ma-  
jority of twenty-six was changed to a  
conservative majority of thirty-six. In  
another borough, where voting took  
place on Friday, though returns were  
not until Saturday night, the liberal  
majority of 104 in the bye-election  
of 1901, was changed to a conserva-  
tive majority of 264. These, with the  
three gains, announced on Saturday  
morning, are hopefully looked upon  
by unionists, as a rift in the clouds.  
The total unionist gains are now  
nine; liberal gains are 139, and labor  
gains thirty-nine.

Nearly a third of the house will be  
elected this week. Two more ministers  
were returned. Mr. Lloyd George, the  
leading cabinet minister, increased his  
majority at Caernarvon from 286 to  
1,224. He expects to bring a solid  
liberal Wales, and returns thus far  
justify his anticipations. The other  
minister was Mr. Harcourt, son of the  
late Sir William Harcourt.

Labor scored one of its most notable  
victories in the contest in East  
Kent, where Sir William Dyke, who  
has represented the riding for twenty  
years, with majorities of over a thou-  
sand, and who was at one time a  
minister, was defeated by Mr. Row-  
lands, a laborite, by 2,504 votes.

A rumor has been current that Sir  
Gilbert Parker was asked to give  
Gravesend to Mr. Balfour, but re-  
plied that Gravesend was won by a  
platform of advanced tariff reform,  
and could not be carried on a retailing  
policy. It is understood that  
nothing will be done in regard to a  
seat for the leader, until after the  
house meets, but the rumor persists  
that Mr. Balfour will go to the House  
of Lords.

The following is a summary of the  
political situation at midnight: Tot-  
al seats, 670; elections held, 480;  
liberals elected, 247; unionists, 114;  
laborites, 41; nationalists, 78.

**In Honor of Queen Victoria.**

London, Jan. 22.—Today being the  
anniversary of the death of Queen Vic-  
toria, who died January 22nd, 1902,  
a memorial service for the late Queen  
was held at the Frogmore mausoleum  
today. Dean Eliot conducted the  
service in the presence of the king and  
queen and other members of the royal  
family. The musical parts of the cere-  
mony were under the direction of Sir  
Walter Parratt and with the assist-  
ance of the clerk and chorists of St.  
George's chapel. After the service the  
king and the queen and most of the  
members of the royal family returned  
to the castle. The mausoleum was  
open all afternoon to visitors who  
had been fortunate enough to obtain  
tickets of admission.

**Five Years For Arson.**

Gore Bay, Jan. 22.—Louis Glen, who  
had a previous conviction against  
him, and was out on suspended sen-  
tence, was yesterday sentenced by  
Police Magistrate W. H. Price to five  
years in Kingston penitentiary for ar-  
son.

**A Costly Game.**

Paris, Jan. 22.—According to M.  
Klotz, reporter of the war budget, in  
the chamber of deputies, the estimates  
for 1906 show an increase in the war  
expenditure of nearly \$6,500,000 over  
1905.

The Asylum for Epileptics at Wood-  
stock, a new provincial institution,  
was yesterday formally handed over  
by the contractor to the provincial  
secretary's department.

The sub-committee on the miners'  
wage scale, sitting at Indianapolis,  
has brought in its report. One clause  
recommended by the committee, the  
employment of boys under sixteen.

Miss Sarah Madden, an actress,  
used Peter Duryea, the millionaire  
horseman some time ago for \$50,000,  
for breach of promise. Duryea married  
Miss Madden last week.

The report is current at Melilla, the  
Spanish settlement on the north coast  
of Morocco, that the Moroccan gun-  
boat Sid Ritz Turki is preparing to  
bombard the Moroccan factory, where  
the Belgian flag is hoisted.

Mrs. James Kane, fifty-five years  
old, was burned to death at her  
home, Hartford, Conn. She struck a  
match to light a lamp and set fire to  
the fire of oil clothing caught fire.

Joseph H. Choate, former ambas-  
sador to Great Britain; Horace Porter,  
former ambassador to France, and  
Judge Rose, of Little Rock, ex-presi-  
dent of the American Bar Association,  
will be the American representatives  
to the approaching conference to be  
held at The Hague.

Bishop John C. Keener, New Or-  
leans, eighty-seven years old, died on  
Friday of heart failure. He served as  
vicar general of chaplains of the con-  
federate army, west of the Mississip-  
pi.

One burglar was killed and another  
fatally wounded on Saturday at  
Desplaines, a suburb of Chicago, in a  
battle between detectives of the Chi-  
cago and Northwestern railroad and  
five men detected in an attempt to  
steal from a repair shop of the rail-  
way company.

**FORCED TO DISROBE.**

Paducah, Ky., Jan. 22.—Because Dr.  
J. M. Payne had recovered judgment  
against him for medical services, Al-  
bert Pitworth, a farmer, stopped the  
physician in the highway, seized his  
Ballard county, at the point of a pis-  
tol, compelling him to get out of his  
buggy, disrobe and wallow in a mud  
hole.

Payne protested at the treatment  
and was struck across the forehead. Sev-  
eral bones were broken. The doctor  
was compelled to sign a statement  
that he had sworn falsely at the trial,  
and was threatened with instant death  
if he ever mentioned the affair to any  
one.

When Dr. Payne was allowed to drive  
he was hurried to Laconter and notified  
the officers. Pitworth was arrested  
near his own home by Constable Joe  
Shelby and carried to Bandana, where  
he is being held pending trial.

Dr. Payne is one of the foremost  
physicians of Ballard county.

A later report from Laconter says  
that Dr. Payne charges Pitworth  
with taking his pocket-book containing  
a small amount of money.
