SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any seven numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 8 and 20, not reserved, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of a family of any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land to be taken is situated, or if the settler is unable to do so, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, the Commissioner of Immigration, the Minister of the Interior, or the local land office, be satisfied by some one to make entry for him.

RESERVED DUTIES: A settler who has been granted an entry for a homestead is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under the following regulations:

(1) At least six months residence upon the cultivation of the land each year during the term of three years.

(2) If the settler is a woman, if the settler is deceased, or if the settler is unable to make a homestead entry under the provisions of this Act, the settler may, by a person who is a resident on a farm in the vicinity of the land to be taken, or by a person who is a resident on a farm in the vicinity of the land to be taken, or by a person who is a resident on a farm in the vicinity of the land to be taken, be satisfied by some one to make entry for him.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land, owned by him, in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

APPLICATION FOR PATENT should be made at the end of three years, he should be satisfied by the local Agent, Sub-Agent or the Homestead Inspector.

Before making application for patent the settler must give six months notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention to do so.

WEST MINING REGULATIONS

Coal lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal, and \$20 per acre for hard coal. Not more than 250 acres can be acquired by an individual or company. Royalty at the rate of \$10 per acre on the gross output.

Quartz—A free miner's certificate is granted upon payment of an advance of \$750 per annum for an individual, and \$500 per annum for a company, and may be renewed by the local miner, having discovered mineral in place, may locate a claim 1500x1500 feet.

The fee for recording a claim is \$5. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim in the first year, and the same must be expended or paid, when \$500 has been expended or paid, the locator may, complying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$1 an acre.

The settler must give six months notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention to do so.

A free miner may obtain two leases of one acre of five miles each for a term of twenty years, renewable at the expiration of ten years. The settler within one section within one section may obtain one lease for each five miles of river located. Royalty at the rate of \$2 per acre on the gross output after it exceeds \$10,000.
