The ommittee, in the best interests of the ity, decided to recommend to the ouncil that \$31,500 of the \$45,000 be laced with the tariff-companies, as the safest. Then the committee hought it could easily afford to give the balance to the non-tariff companes. The committee desired to give to the city gilt-edged security for its

Ald, Polson said he was up against

this same proposition thirteen years ago. Local insurance men influenced he aldermen and the council had capitulated again. Ald. Polson held hat the city should fight against the obbery of insurance companies, which were charging most exorbitant rates. Kingston should take a stand now. The Union company had been bulldozed into the surrender of its policy with the city.
