After the close of the Crimean war and the troops returned to Canada, military enthusiasm began to die out, and the companies, with the exception of No. 1, dwindled away. At this time a number of changes took place in No. 1 company. Capt. Shaw was promoted to the rank of major; Lieut. John Sutherland retired; Ensign William Ramage was appointed captain, and James Minnes, lieutenant.

The company had just received their new uniform, which was made in Lancashire, England, consisting of a rifle green tunic with red facings, dark trousers with broad stripes of red and black, Prince Albert shako with leather peak front and rear; a red cord with tassels was attached to the shako and passed under the shoulder strap to a button on the breast. It was a smart looking uniform and was greatly admired.

No. 3, the Highland company at this time had ceased drilling, and an attempt was made by a John Burleigh to form a rifle company in its stead, but it proved a failure.

arms, and the men to provide their own uniforms, and to give their services into a company to be known as the 14th Battalion Rifles. Major Shaw was elected captain, John Sutherland, Lieutenant, and William Ramage, ensign. The company was gazetted early in 1855. The arms furnished by the government were short rifles and sword bayonets, and was called the Satura rifle. The rifle had two grooves in the barrel, and the barrel was spherical with a raised band around it to fit in the groove.

The uniform of the company was a handsome one, similar to a rifle officers mess uniform, Shell jacket, black trousers, with black braid stripes, and black cap with brass band and leather visor.

The uniform cost each member twenty-eight dollars. Lieut. John Sutherland was the drill instructor of the company. No. 1, met for drill in several places—the old police station of Wellington street, court house on King street, Anchor buildings, corner King and Brock streets, Uncle's nation and Brock streets, and the old Commercial Bank on Princess street, which became their headquarters and armory.

The company met regularly and the men took great interest in drill and target practice. In the early mornings of spring and summer, they would parade in City Park, and practice street fighting, and manoeuvring alone Wellington and King streets to the armory.

A short time after the formation of No. 1 Rifles, two other companies were organized, one by James O'Reilly, and the other by Donald McIntosh.

No. 2 Rifles, consisted of three officers and about fifty men. The officers were Capt. James O'Reilly, Lieut. Peter O'Reilly and Ensign Michael Sullivan. The men were uniformed in a long dark green tunic, dark trousers, and a tall shako with a large plume of green feathers, which gave them the appearance of Grenadiers.

No. 3, for the Highland Company numbered three officers and about fifty men. The officers were Capt. Donald McIntosh, Lieut. Walter McLean, and Ensign John F. Whitehead. They were in full body of uniform. They were armed with a long French rifle and bayonet. They wore a handsome uniform. Prince Charlie, Glengarry cap, and tartan trews and Glengarry cap.

The drill shed was not erected at this time, and the companies would meet for company drill at the armoury, and for battalion drill at the Artillery Barracks square, or the skating rink on King street. Drill were kept up regularly throughout the year.

In the fall of 1864 a call came for a company of sixty-four men to be sent to service at Niagara. The battalion was paraded in the City hall, the orders read, and the call for volunteers made. At once the required number stepped to the front. The officers were: Maj. Thomas Fitz Roy Kelly, captain; George Seale, lieutenant, and John Johnston, ensign. A color-sergeant was at once appointed, who fell

in the men, and stood their names, and they were sworn in for service. They were then addressed by Lieut.-Col. Shaw, brigade major, and several other officers present. The men were then dismissed to go to their quarters in the Ontario hall at nine o'clock the following morning. Their quarters until orders came for their transportation to Niagara, where they were to be No. 3 company of the 2nd Administrative Battalion under command of Lieut. Col. W. D. Currie, A.A.G., of the second military district.
