KEPT THEM INTACT

THREE RUSSIAN STANDARDS RESCUED.

Officer and Two Privates Wrap Treasured Flags About Their Bodies and Hide Them From Japanese During Period of Captivity.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 27.—An inspiring story of the preservation of the standards of three of the Russian regiments at Port Arthur was revealed today.

When Fort Arthur surrendered the men stripped the colors from the staffs and concealed them beneath their uniforms, wearing them around their bodies by night and by day until they boarded a steamer for their return to Russia.

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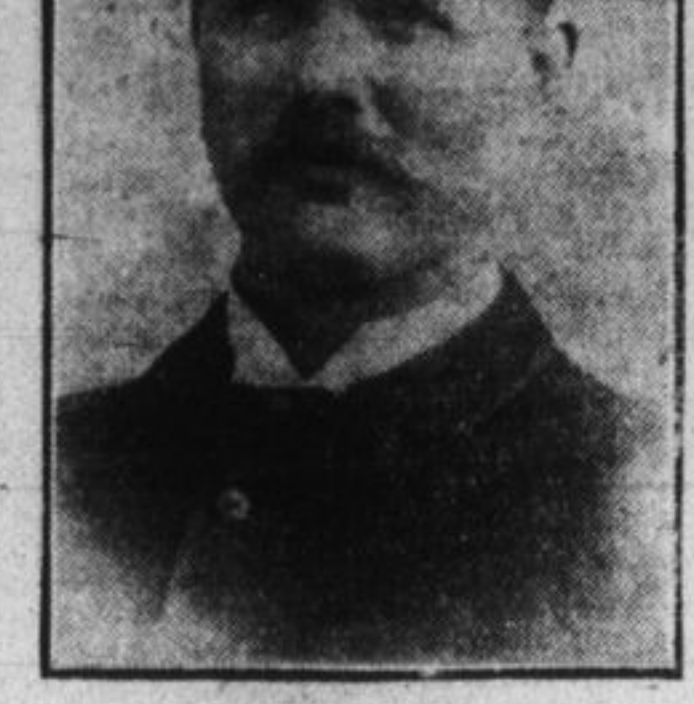
