HE DEEDS HIS BODY WANTS LOCOMOTOR ATAXIA CURE DISCOVERED.

So He Devotes His Remains to the Cause of Science—Anxious That Physicians Should Benefit by His Death.

New York, Jan. 29.—The Herald publishes the following: While a celebration was taking place in a new dining-room of the Colonial hotel at Eighth avenue and 125th street, on Tuesday night, John T. Jackson, fifty years old, a member of a prominent Lancashire family in England, deliberately wrote a letter, wrapped a comforter about his body, drank cyanide of potassium and lay down to die.

Jackson had been a sufferer from locomotor ataxia for eight years, and had once been partially cured. When he says that the old malady had returned and he was in constant pain he decided to die.

In his letter Mr. Jackson directed that his body be taken to Bellevue hospital and there devoted to science. He was anxious, he wrote, that the physician who had been kind to him in that institution two years ago, when he was suffering with pneumonia should benefit by his death.

Mr. Jackson wrote further that his body might assist in some way to the discovery of a cure for locomotor ataxia. He said he had been all over the world and had seen everything worth seeing.

HELPLESS CHICAGO.
There is Great Demand for Many Officers.

Chicago, Jan. 29.—In six months there have been sixty-two murders in Chicago.

On the records of the police department are 200 unsolved murder mysteries.

Chief of Police Collins ascribes the prevalence of crime to an inadequate police force, a grossly inefficient system of the police system which liberates habitual criminals from the state prisons almost as rapidly as the police send them there, and the ineffectiveness of lawyers of political influence who prevent the enforcement of punitive laws. He says: "Chicago has fewer policemen to-day than it has had since 1891. We need 1,500 more young men and the displacement of 500 supernumerary men now on the force, and abolition of the saloons and club rooms which afford rendezvous for young hoodlums. Habitual criminals should not be given pardons and criminals of the upper classes should be punished as well as the moneyless and friendless." Chief Collins makes the remarkable admission that it was dangerous for women to be out at night in Chicago and advises them to remain indoors.

JEWISH WORLD CONGRESS.
To Consider the Situation of the Jews in Russia.

Brussels, Jan. 29.—The General Jewish Congress called by the Zionist organization to consider and discuss the situation of the Jews in Russia, met here, to-day. The attendance is large and nearly every country of the world is represented by delegates. The brutal outrages against the Jews in Russia have aroused general indignation all over the world and have given a strong impetus to the cause of the Zionists who aim at the establishment in Palestine of a legally secured home for the Jewish people.

The leaders of the Zionist movement, have sent an appeal for financial help all over the world and have addressed Jews and Gentiles alike, urging them to contribute toward a fund, which would enable the Zionists to help the oppressed Jews in Russia. All Jews who sympathize with the Zionist movement, are urged to purchase a stock each for twenty-five cents, which will entitle the owner to vote for a delegate to the Zionist congress. Those Jews who are not Zionists and persons who are not Jews, but sympathize with the oppressed Jews in Russia, are urged to purchase Terumah, which also cost twenty-five cents a piece, but confer no rights or privileges, but are merely a token of the owner's sympathy with the oppressed or with the work of the Zionists.
