Any even numbered section of Domin-on Lands in Manitoba or the North-west Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not secret, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, pf 160 acres, more or less. Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land to be taken is situated, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on applica-tion to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigra-tion, Winnipeg, or the local agent for the district in which the land is situate, sceive authority for some one to make MESTEAD DUTIES 1 A settler whstead is required to perform the con-ditions connected therewith under one

(1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) If the father (or mother if the ather is deceased; of any person who is eligible to make a homestead entry under the provisions of this Act, resides der the provisions of this Act, resides apon a farm in the vicinity of the land satered for by such person as a homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by sch person residing with he father or trother.

THE WEATHER.

Fourteen Mild Winters Seventy-Three Years.

R. F. Stupart, director of the Do minion meteorological service, furnishes some interesting facts regarding | Store at In the past seventy-three years there

have been fourteen winters of a cidedly mild type. Of these that of 1841-2 was the hildest with an average temperature of 30.5 for the four months December-March and those of 1881-2 and 1889-90 were not much colder with a mean temperature each instance of 29.9 degrees. It is of interest to note that in eight of the fourteen years the mild weather of De cember and January continued during February, while in three of the other years the temperature was very slightconsiderably below. In only two of the fourteen years was March much below average, while in ten cases it was above average, and in six of these cidedly above.

While these facts are suggestive the probable character of the next two months, the meteorologist would he quite unjustified in making a sonal forecast, as he is as yet ignor ant of the causes which lead to such vast differences as occur in the character of the corresponding seasons in different years. He believes, however that a wide departure from average weather conditions over any particular portion of the globe is caused, not b local conditions, but by variations the atmospheric circulation over whole earth, and these variations probably due to a varying output solar energy.


