THE TURMOIL

In France Over Inventory-taking is Growing. A STUBBORN FIGHT IS BEING MADE AGAINST SEPARATION BILL. Armed Force Assailed Parishioners of St. Clothilde's Church, 100 Being Injured—Many Arrests Made, Including Two Priests.

Paris, Feb. 2.—Everywhere in France the actual putting into operation of the clause of the church and state separation bill, which provides for the inventory of the properties of the churches, has aroused a storm of protest. In several provincial parishes, Roman Catholics have gathered in the churches, and made such strong resistance that the government commissioners were unable to enter. In Paris, yesterday, violent scenes occurred in several churches, notably those of St. Roch and St. Clothilde. An inventory of the property of the church of St. Roch has not been made owing to the opposition of the congregation, but the defenders of the latter church succeeded before the energetic assault of an armed force, after an encounter in which more than 100 persons were injured. Many arrests were made, two priests among them.

The Very Latest Culled From All Over The World. Ald. Ekos elected mayor of Montreal by 3,443 majority. The judge gave the seat to Mr. Bole (liberal) in the Regina recount. The German steamer Gemma was fired on in the North Sea by an unknown schooner. A party of British labor M.P.'s, including Mr. Keir Hardie will visit Canada in August. All parties are pleased with the choice of Hon. P. Brodeur to succeed Hon. R. Prefontaine. Morris Wallace, G.T.R. news agent, Hamilton, is arrested for stealing a purse from his landlady. A new temperance fight is being organized in Toronto to work for a local option law for the city. A phenomenally rich discovery of copper has been made near Dean Lake on the Soo branch of the C.P.R. Prince county, P.E.I., voted to substitute total prohibition for the Scott act by over 1,100 majority. The Allan steamer Carthaginian from Glasgow, arrived at Philadelphia at 10 a.m., on February 1st.

Says Chamberlain Will Not Be Leader. THE BITTER ATTACK ON BALFOUR HAS DEFINITELY DECIDED HIM. He Will Never Deviate From the Path of Perfect Loyalty. He Has So Unswervingly Followed.

London, Feb. 2.—"Chamberlain will not lead," says the London Daily Mail, a unionist organ. With positiveness, seemingly inspired, the paper adds: "Mr. Chamberlain has formally announced that he is not a candidate for the leadership of the party. He gives no sign of departing from his mature and carefully considered decision, nor is such a departure to be expected in the future." "Now that Mr. Balfour has been so bitterly attacked it is certain that Mr. Chamberlain will be less than ever inclined to deviate from the path of perfect loyalty which he has held out for himself, and so unswervingly followed."

As a result of the meeting of the tariff reform committee, it is said, that Mr. Chamberlain will raise the fiscal question early in the session. THIEF TRAILED BY SCENT. Odor of Violets Leads to Stolen Bracelet. Geneva, Feb. 2.—A young woman who is to be married next week invited her intimate friends yesterday to see her wedding presents. After their departure she found that a valuable gold bracelet, the gift of her future husband, was missing from its case. As nobody but her intimate girl friends had been in the room, she concluded that one of them must be the thief. A faint odor of violet sent coming from the jewel case supplied a clue to the thief. The young woman drove to the house of the suspected person next day, and boldly accused her of the robbery. The girl confessed and returned the bracelet at once. There will now be only three bridesmaids at the wedding instead of four.

WHAT THEY DO. Men of Many Professions in New House. London, Feb. 2.—In the composition of the new House of Commons, barristers are the most numerous class, there being 100 of them. Manufacturers come next, numbering seventy. They are followed by sixty merchants, forty-five ex-army officers, thirty-four solicitors, twenty-nine journalists, twenty shipowners and shipbuilders, nineteen authors, ten mine owners, ten doctors, and ten lawyers. DEFENDS MEMORY.

Marlborough Takes Up Cudgels For Dead Uncle. London, Feb. 2.—The Duke of Marlborough, who married Consuelo Vanderbilt, has come into the limelight as a defender of the memory of his uncle, the late Lord Randolph Churchill. The duke doesn't like some statements made by the reviewer of Winston Churchill's biography of his father, the particular thing objected to being the bold declaration that Lord Randolph's "treatment of his friends was often atrocious, sometimes even not honorable, and he was very careless of truth."

APPEALS TO PEASANTS.

Not to Take Possession of Private Lands. St. Petersburg, Feb. 2.—In view of the profound convictions prevailing among the marshals of the nobility, members of the Zemstvos, and other classes in touch with the peasants that spring will witness a renewal of the agrarian disorders on a more deplorable scale than before, the emperor has addressed a plain mandate to the peasantry setting forth that the rights of property are sacred and that the peasants will be violating his will if they attempt to enter into possession of private lands. At the same time his majesty assures the peasants that with the co-operation of the national assembly he will institute measures for their relief.

MUST STOP WORK.

'Stool Pigeons' Cut Out of Prospectives. Winnipeg, Feb. 2.—The local legislature decided, yesterday, that no "stool-pigeons" must be placed on general obsequies to the application of the principle to an insurance company seeking incorporation, preferring later on to cover the matter with a general bill, but the members thought they could not begin too early to stop the practice of giving stock to prominent men for the use of their names.

TWO PRISONERS FIGHT.

Max Genser Struck With Bottle in Jail. Montreal, Feb. 2.—A desperate fight between two prisoners at the Montreal jail is reported, in which Max Genser, a bankrupt debtor, whose affairs are now in the hands of the court, was struck on the head with a bottle and badly injured by a fellow-prisoner named Max Phillips. The trouble arose over a bath which Genser wanted and which Phillips, who was ward captain, refused. Genser is in the hands of the doctors.

Sent Up For Trial.

Ottawa, Feb. 2.—Bernard Mahon, charged with stealing \$100 from Frank E. Davis, Toronto, was committed for trial by Magistrate O'Keefe this morning. Mahon found the bill on a bar-room floor, where Davis dropped it. He apparently made no effort to find the owner, got it changed and went to Montreal with a friend and spent it.

Died in Hospital.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., Feb. 2.—A gunshot wound, in the abdomen, resulted fatally in the case of William Boyer, of Garden River, who is dead in the hospital. The shooting was accidental. Boyer was eighteen years of age.

Plaster Hit The Judge.

Halifax, N.S., Feb. 2.—Falling plaster from a ceiling in a place of business where he was, hit Justice Fraser on the head, causing a painful wound. A surgeon attended to his injuries, which proved less serious than was at first reported.

An Ex-M.P., Dead

St. Thomas, Ont., Feb. 2.—Ex-Mayor and ex-M.P. Thomas Arkell died, this morning, aged eighty-two years. Death resulted from a fall sustained two months ago. Mr. Arkell was a native of Gloucestershire, England.
