

Prof. Shortt said that the mayor's uggestion was exactly what was in he municipal act of 1841. Afterwards, the people wanted annual elections, so the law was changed. Annual councils came into force in Ontario in 1849. Up to 1867 there were both councillors and aldermen Kingston, this system being taken from the New England states, where there are elected and the aldermen appointed by the councillors. That system is English.

Defects of Present System. Ald. Polson asked Prof. Shortt what he considered to be the defects

Prof. Shortt replied that the chief defects were lack of continuity policy and lack of experience of aldermen, Consequently where the municipal interests grow to importance in larger cities, there is a tendency to reduction for the purpose of combining diffused legislative power with a concentrated executive power. Now Toronto had virtually two hambers-a city council and a board of control. The council is elected by wards, and the board of control by
