COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

That is Going On in the Business World—The Markets.

The amount of bounty paid on Canadian iron and steel for the past calendar year was \$1,900,000. The yearly value of seaweed prepared in Japan is valued at about \$490,000. It is used for human food and as manure.

The C.P.R. have placed an order with the Dominion Car Company for two hundred steel coal cars costing upwards of a million and a half.

The announcement that the Dominion divided instead of at the rate of 10 per cent. was made at the annual meeting last night. Toronto is doing so, the directors restore the rate to what it was before 1910.

There is a belief in some quarters that the Union Pacific will play an important part in the Vanderbilt railroad project. It is claimed that W. K. Vanderbilt, holder of 175,000 shares of Union Pacific stock.

Canadian land sales for January, 1916, totaled 42,249 acres, for \$273,115, against 54,560 acres for \$341,750 in January, 1915. In January, 1916, were 7,852 acres for \$51,750, against 527 acres for \$2,000 last year.

The London Statist estimates the holdings of Russia in Germany at \$1,000,000,000 and the French holdings at \$2,000,000,000. Practically the entire Russian balance, both countries are locked up in Russia, and it will be some years before they can probably released.

Masters And Matrs.

The masters and matrs had a luncheon meeting, last evening, in their rooms over Wake's drug store, at which important business was transacted. Capt. James Dix was appointed to represent Kingstons council at the grand lodge meeting in Toronto on February 13th. The Kingstons is No. 7 and in a flourishing condition, with a membership of 200, its territory extending from Port Hope to Montreal.

Steps were taken towards having an "At Home" and committees formed. About twenty-five or thirty members meet in the rooms every afternoon and play cards, checkers and a game called "Devil Among the Sailors," which causes great excitement. The rooms are well furnished with reading matter, latest papers, etc. Capt. Donnelly placed the large plates with drawings of ships from A.B. 1066 up to the present time, which he used in his lectures. All the members appreciate Capt. Donnelly's lectures and all attend.

Concert And Tea.

One of the most successful entertainments that has ever taken place in the country, was held at the Burnie Methodist church, Wednesday evening. Long before the appointed hour the building was packed to its utmost capacity. The programme, which consisted of Kingstons' best talent, drew some from the surrounding district, was everything that could be desired, and the order given throughout showed fully the appreciation of the audience, each number being so well received that one could scarcely tell which gave the most pleasure. During the evening refreshments were served by the ladies of the congregation, which were much enjoyed. Truly it can be said that all went home feeling that the evening's entertainment was a decided success.

Excursion To Toronto.

The Queen's hockey excursion to Toronto, to-day, was taken advantage of by over a hundred people. Doubtless more would have gone had the weather remained as mild as it was during the middle of the week. The excursion was by special train which left the G. R. R. station at half past eleven o'clock. It is the first hockey excursion to Toronto, and doubtless, will be made an annual event.

Assembly At Barriefield.

A most successful assembly was held in town hall, Barriefield, last evening. Over seventy-five couples were present, including many from the city. Music for dancing was supplied by Crosby and O'Connor's orchestra. At midnight dainty refreshments were served, after which dancing was continued till an early hour this morning.

ELEVEN BELOW ZERO

TORONTO IS EXPERIENCING A FREEZE UP.

A Man of Fifty-One, Attempts Suicide by Swallowing Laudanum—Doctors Are Trying to Save His Life.

Toronto, Feb. 2.—James Hoover, fifty-one years of age, wrote a letter to P. M. Ellis, and to his son, who is employed in the same place, stating that he was going to the woods for his last long sleep. This was yesterday, but this morning, about eleven o'clock, Hoover went into an office in the education department, and after talking for a few minutes with a clerk, named Faulk, deliberately swallowed a bottle of laudanum. He was taken to St. Michael's hospital, and the doctors are now working on him, trying to save his life.

Toronto is to-day, experiencing the coldest snap of the winter so far. The lowest temperature registered was 11.6 degrees below zero, about 6 p.m. At eight o'clock the thermometer stood at eleven below zero.

A fire marshal to investigate all fires independently of any action taken by insurance companies, was the proposal brought before the provincial secretary at the meeting of the Firewriters' Association, this morning. The statement was made that one-third to one-half of the fires were due to preventable causes, and that a large proportion of the fires were of incendiary nature. Hon. Mr. Hanna promised consideration of the matter.

George Lair, Buffalo, has been appointed Grand Trunk agent at Port Erie to succeed J. J. Beck, who has been appointed superintendent of the Union station, Toronto.

An application was made at Onegoode Hall, to-day, for the winding up of the Merchants Premium company. The capital stock of the company was \$4,000 and the subscribed capital \$25,000. The liabilities are \$3,500 and assets \$3,000. The application was enlarged till Tuesday.

FAVORS A CANAL.

Between Pittsburg and Lake Erie to Cost \$60,000,000.

Washington, D.C., Feb. 2.—The house sub-committee of the committee on railways and canals decided to report favorably on a bill granting a federal charter for the construction of a canal between Pittsburg, Pa., and Lake Erie, the lake entrance to the canal to be at Ashtabula, Ohio. The bill contemplates a canal one hundred miles long and twelve feet deep, with favorable conditions of approximately \$60,000,000.

The waterway is to furnish cheap transportation for iron ore from lake regions to the steel works of Pittsburg, with a new type of boat, which can be operated both on the lake and in the canal. Fifteen years is to be allowed for the canal's construction, though the estimate of time actually necessary is seven years.

WILL BUILD SHAMROCK IV.

Provided Cup Racing Rules Are Modified.

London, Feb. 2.—A news agency despatch from Glasgow says that if the New York yacht club will agree to modify the America's cup racing rules to measurements Sir Thomas Lipton will immediately commission Alfred Heyne, the Glasgow architect, to design and the Denny Bros., of Dumbarton, to build a Shamrock IV.

THE EMPRESS DOWAGER

Of Russia is in Very Poor Health.

Copenhagen, Denmark, Feb. 2.—The health of the dowager Empress of Russia, daughter of King Christian, is giving her relatives a great deal of anxiety. The dowager empress has been completely overwhelmed with grief on account of the death of her father.

CALL FOR TENDERS

For First Two Sections of the N.T.R.

Ottawa, Feb. 2.—The Canadian Gazette to-morrow, will contain a notice calling for tenders for the first two sections of the N.T.R., one link going to Winnipeg and Fort William; the other the commencement of the eastern terminals.

Some Samples Adulterated.

Ottawa, Feb. 2.—The department of inland revenue issued a bulletin today of analyses of the samples of alcoholic preparations of ginger. Of the samples of tinctures, essences or extracts collected in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, Quebec City and British Columbia, all are reported genuine. Some of the samples collected in London, Toronto, Kingston, Montreal and St. Hyacinthe were found to be adulterated.

LIKELY THE LAST TRIP.

Of New Island Wanderer For the Winter.

The trip of the steamer New Island Wanderer from Cape Vincent to Kingston this afternoon looks like the last for some time to come. The ice is making very rapidly in the harbor and the river. Yesterday the harbor was open; this afternoon there is a thickness of two inches of ice. By tomorrow morning, there will be six inches if this temperature below the zero continues.

The Wanderer left the Cape at 10:30 o'clock this morning via the foot of Wolfe Island, and reached Folger's wharf at 1:45 o'clock this afternoon. Ice was met all the way. The Wanderer did not go back this afternoon, so that there was no connection from here to the Cape to-day. The likelihood is that the steamer has made her last trip for the winter.

On January 9th, the Wanderer ceased making the Cape trips, owing to the harbor being ice-bound. For a week she was in winter quarters, and then resumed her regular work, having disappeared during the mild spell that began about January 15th. Since then navigation has been open. February 2nd is the latest date in many years that the Cape or Island ferry steamers have run.

Appointments Of Officers.

The department of militia announces that Lieutenant-colonel's commanding brigades, and brigade majors, will be appointed for periods of three years. Such appointments shall be made as a rule from reserve of officers. That of lieutenant-colonel commanding will be conferred upon officers who have held the command of their corps for the prescribed period. Any officer accepting appointment will, in the event of his being unable to perform any of the annual trainings, be liable to be called upon to vacate the appointment. Principal medical officers, not belonging to the permanent medical corps will receive an allowance of \$305 per annum. In return for this allowance, in addition to their other duties, they will carry on the examination of recruits. If more than twenty-five recruits are examined and accepted during the same month these officers will be entitled to fifty cents for each extra recruit accepted.

THE COLDEST DAY

MUCH INCONVENIENCE EXPERIENCED IN MONTREAL.

Will Help the Ice Conditions if Weather Continues—A Famine Would Not Likely Occur.

Montreal, Feb. 2.—The sudden drop in the temperature from above freezing point, yesterday, to below zero, this morning, entailed many discomforts to Montrealers. This has been the coldest day of the winter. Hopes of ice men are revived, to-day, with the cold snap. A continuation of the present conditions would go a long way towards relieving the threatened ice famine.

ANNUAL MEETING

To Consider Prevention of Consumption.

The sixth annual meeting of the Canadian Association for the Prevention of Consumption will be held in the railway committee room of the House of Commons, on March 25th. Senator Edwards will preside in the afternoon. In the evening a public lecture will be delivered in the Normal school by Dr. Arthur J. Richer, of Montreal, illustrating with stereoscopic plates, showing the stages of consumption, and some of the appliances in use to check and cure the disease. The chair will be taken in the evening by the governor-general. These hints are from the Medical Record.

There are more cases of advanced tuberculosis than of any other disease. In no disease can so much be done to render the patient comfortable and hopeful in the advanced stage. There is no disease where one case in a family can so readily infect other members, particularly in the stage where the consumptive begins to be confined to the close association of the family.

It is important to remember that advanced consumptive patients able to get about, or able to work at their ordinary calling in the office or factory, constitute the greatest danger to the health of the community. They are the most frequent cause of infection. The careless, ignorant or helpless consumptive confined to bed can do little more than infect his room, but the advanced patient able to follow some calling can, if careless, scatter 7,000,000,000 bacilli every day with ease. Of all tuberculosis patients, he should be the most carefully instructed and most deeply impressed.

THE YUKON'S INTERESTS.

Commissioner McInnes to Visit Ottawa.

Dawson, Y.T., Feb. 2.—Commissioner McInnes leaves on Friday for Ottawa to secure the aid of parliament to install a water system, costing six million dollars, to make it possible to work gravel estimated to contain over two hundred million dollars. He will also investigate the standing of the civil service, ask for the passage of a new miners' lien law, and for an investigation into the exorbitant rates of the White Pass company. He will also endeavor to secure new regulations for the disposal of crown lands and timber, a new system of policing the territory, and the extension of the constitution of the Yukon colony.

Mr. McInnes will show that, with generous estimates for the Yukon, prosperity will return here, and the yield of gold will again return to the old figures of twenty million dollars per annum.

Disalander in Weekly Standard.

In England the pendulum swung furiously at the last election; it swings back even more furiously at this. To specify the exact causes, local or general, of the revolution in the order of importance is hopeless. In the manufacturing districts generally the vote has been against corn laws, of which the bitter memory lingers there, Birmingham was perhaps in some degree by the connection of some of its manufacturers with war. In Wales and Scotland, non-conformity prevails wherever there has been a strong revolt against the education act. Hodge has no doubt voted as usual for his three acres and his cow. He has evidently come out in force. The weakness, shortcomings and egotism of the late government have no doubt had their effect, especially on the critical mind of the metropolis. The most striking, and, in the eyes of all to whom socialism is an object of alarm, is the large number of labor men who have been elected. With this the revolution in Russia, inflaming socialist spirit and kindling socialist hopes, may have had something to do. But the movement is evidently advancing.
