**THE VARIOUS DOINGS IN THE RELIGIOUS WORLD.**

**An Odd Protest—Would Not Linger Long on Point—Continental Sunday is Enjoyed in Chicago.**  
Blows were exchanged at Lathrop Free church, Scotland, over dismissal of its pastor.  
Two men in Cincinnati have given \$16,000 to foreign missions of the Christian Church.

ian Church, U. S. A., and the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. The joint ballot on union showed only one dissenting vote to this re-union of north and south. Verily Union is in the air.  
The Puritans of New England fought against the observance of Christmas, because it was in their eyes a popish, yes, even heathenish, feast. In 1659 the court of Massachusetts ordered that any one failing to go to work on the day, or observing it in any way, should be fined five shillings, a heavy penalty in those days of small earnings. This extraordinary law lasted for over thirty years.  
Sir Oliver Lodge, speaking to the Christian Social Union at Birmingham, said the essential elements in Christianity are taught and exemplified by "that Syrian carpenter of gentle and pathetic figure" are its conception of the humanity of God and the divinity of man. Probably in the next stage of our existence we shall only be conscious of the presence of those persons with whom we had some spiritual affinity and to whom we were bound by ties of affinity.

Dr. Taylor proclaims that the great Dufferin Andrew—with his millions, has put a spoke in the wheel of the sustentation fund. He crippled subscriptions. By his organs he has urged congregations "on to the ice." By his benefactions he has induced congregations to forego their old perceptor and set up a "kist of whistles," which means a large expenditure for choirs and organs, the general interests of the church by restrictive growing in other directions.

J. D. Rockefeller offered \$100,000 to the Baptist college if a similar amount were given by his friends; \$150,000 has been contributed in response. This was in Nova Scotia.  
The United States spends on charity twice as much a year as the huge standing army of Germany costs. This fact disposes of a lot of talk against the selfishness of the Christian world.  
Miss Matilda Mercer, Bristol, Eng., left \$100,000 for charitable institutions. Howard Paul, journalist, left \$265,000 for charities, Mrs. Wilson, Newport, Scotland, left \$400,000 to U. F. Church.  
Judge Albert H. Gary, chairman executive committee of the steel trust, built a \$100,000 church at Wheaton, Ill., in memory of his parents, devout Methodists, and has recently given a valuable business block for endowing the church.  
A learned Englishman who has been studying Babylonian records, especially the inscription of Nabonidus, finds they report the flood about 2345 B.C., which agrees closely with the Bible's date and also with Chinese and Hindu reckoning.  
The central committee, representing the World's Sunday School Convention, in charge of the interests of 250,000 Sunday Schools, with an enrollment of 26,000,000 members, has voted to hold the world's fifth convention in Rome, May 20th, coming, Dr. August Schmidt, physician, St. Louis, has given money for the erection of a church in that city, in which all denominations will be free to worship. There will be no sermon, no choir and no collection. An organ operated by electricity will furnish sacred music.

The parishioners, Poles, of St. Cassimer's church, St. Louis, objected to the priest sent to take charge of the Church by Archbishop Glennon, therefore they locked the edifice against him. A protest meeting ended in a riot, a police charge and seven arrests.  
Mrs. Burnett's story, "The Dawn of a Tomorrow," concluded in Scribner's, should interest every one who believes in Faith as an essential influence in everyday life. It pictures a slum of London revolutionized through the intensity of faith in one poor woman.  
In Ponce, Porto Rico, a prophet has appeared, representing himself as the spirit of St. John the Evangelist, preaching in the villages and about 3,000 people have left their homes and labor to follow him. At times he preaches some Bible truths and at other times the contrary.  
The Tribune calls attention to the extent to which the American Sunday has been succeeded in Chicago by the Continental Sunday. It names twenty-five theaters open besides various sports and amusements in the parks and elsewhere; labor meetings are usually held on Sunday; the saloons, 7,000 or more, are wide open.  
After a division of ninety-five years union has been agreed upon at St. Louis at a joint session of general committees, which, if formally ratified by the general assemblies in May next, will unite the Presbyter-

**Baneul Literature.**  
The character of English fiction has of late, generally speaking, most seriously deteriorated. Books which have a distinctly immoral tendency, or the writers of which seem to gloat over incidents foul in their suggestions, are freely circulated, and read even by the daughters of Christian homes.  
That is the indictment of modern fiction by Archbishop Capetown in his charge at the inauguration of the Synod of Bloemfontein. A monthly review shows that out of eighty-seven recent novels seventeen spoke of marriage as a thing played out, eleven glorify co-responses, twenty-two practically advocate the infidelity of husbands, seven ridicule the woman who is true to her vows, and twenty-three speak of the betrayal of young women unreservedly. There was thus left a "miserable balance" of seven novels that are presumably fit for decent people to read.

**Army Rescue Work.**  
In one of the worst slum sections of New York, a district notorious for "gangs" and their friends, and rascals, the Salvation Army will open in February, a fine building which has cost \$80,000. This house, intended for the benefit of women, will have a hall for recreation and another equipped with sewing machines and facility for designing and making garments. There is a day nursery for the care of 100 very young children by Army nurses during the working hours, when their mothers cannot attend to them. The materials will be supplied free of charge, and sterilized foods for the infants. There is a laundry where women can do their own work or that of others as a means of earning money. Rooms will be let to working girls at trifling rents.

**Perhaps You Don't Approve?**  
The church and stage have been drawn closer by the efforts of Rev. J. Greathead, rector of Corringham, Essex, England, and his wife. The latter, a daughter of late Dr. Gauntlett, of musical fame, has written a "romantic play, founded on fact," "The Master Carver," in which her husband plays the part of the hero. The play was produced at Southend, in the parish room of All Saints', of which Dr. Lang, an enthusiastic devotee of things theatrical, is the vicar. There was a crowded audience which showed appreciation. The other characters were taken by villagers of Corringham. Mr. Greathead has had an amateur dramatic company in connection with the church for twelve years, and never found any prejudice against his well-selected plays among church people.

**WHY UNCLE SAM SMILES.**  
Big Treasury Deficit of Your Age Wiped Out.  
Washington, D.C., Feb. 3.—One year ago there was a deficit in the United States treasury of over \$28,500,000, which has now been reduced to less than \$3,400,000, with the prospect that this amount will be wiped out within the next thirty days.  
To-day there is an available cash balance on hand, including deposits in the National banks, of nearly \$144,000,000, with the daily receipts more than equaling the expenditures.  
This improved condition is due almost entirely to large increases in customs and internal revenue receipts.  
During January the customs receipts alone amounted to \$28,859,912, which is an excess over January, 1905, of over \$4,500,000 and since July 1st last, the customs receipts have exceeded those for the corresponding period last year by over \$22,500,000.  
During the same period internal revenue receipts have increased over \$9,000,000.
