**THE SPORT REVIEW**  
 THE CHAMPIONSHIP SHOULD COME TO QUEEN'S.

**McGill to Play Here Next Friday**  
 —Shameful Trouncing Queen's Gave Varsity—General Notes on Sports.

Queen's meet McGill here next Friday night, and if they win, the intercollegiate senior championship will again come to Kingston. With the present seven on the ice, there is little chance of Queen's losing. McGill, however, are still confident that they can win the silver mug in Kingston. Patrick will be on the line for the next game, which will greatly increase the strength of the forward line. The intercollegiate cup was presented to the union by Queen's when the league was inaugurated in 1903. Queen's have won the championship once and McGill twice.

**A Perfect Shame.**  
 Concerning the Queen's Varsity match, the Toronto Mail-Empire says: "Queen's did to Varsity is a shame to relate. The Presbyterians trounced the blue and white in a serious intercollegiate match by the one-sided score of 12 to 4, and trounced them well. And the game resembled the score in more ways than one. It was all Queen's and nothing but Queen's. The shifters, outskated, outchecked, outskated and apparently outclassed the whole Varsity team from goal to centre. It was easy money for the Presbyterians, and Richardson and Walsh took off numerous spectacular dashes unobscured. Crawford figured frequently, and Dabson was by no means weak. Macdonell did yeoman service at point. Mills, the visitors' goalkeeper, gave a splendid exhibition of 'as 'ow the puck should be kept hot. He made some magnificent stops. Richardson and Walsh sentitized repeatedly. The former particularly distinguished himself by lightning rushes and masterly stick handling.

**IN THE CHURCHES**

**FESTIVAL OF PURIFICATION IN ST. MARY'S.**

**Sermon By Rev. Fr. Mes—Service of Song at Sydenham Street Church—Bolivia Missionary in First Baptist.**

Yesterday (the fifth Sunday after Epiphany) the festival of the purification of the Virgin Mary was observed in St. Mary's cathedral. The ceremony of blessing the candles and the usual procession took place, the reverend rector of the cathedral officiating. Grand high mass was afterwards celebrated by Rev. Fr. Kehoe. The sermon was preached by Rev. Fr. Mes, who took his text from the Gospel of St. Matthew xiii, 24-30. A very lucid and interesting explanation of the gospel was given, dwelling especially on the tares and the good wheat in the field of the husbandman. Many practical lessons were drawn from the text by the speaker. The choir rendered in an excellent manner the Kyrie and Gloria from Gounod's short mass, the Sanctus and Agnus Dei by Colomi, Miss Lyons and Mrs. Armstrong taking the solos in fine style. The offertory, the organist rendered the "Ave Maria" by Schubert, showing his complete control over the beautiful instrument. Rev. Fr. O'Reilly acted as master of ceremonies. The altar was handsomely decorated.

**Good Songs Rendered.**

The music in Queen Street Methodist church last night was exceptionally fine. After an aside sermon on "The Mysterious Expedition," Christ's going away, The Comforter might come, Ross Bradley sang "The Better Land"—and beautifully—it rendered that the congregation went on to see him resume his seat. A quartette, too, by Messrs. Shea, Rutherford, Bradley and Mulholland, was delightfully rendered. The congregational singing was decidedly inspiring.

**In St. Andrew's Church.**

The pulpit of St. Andrew's church was occupied last evening's service by M. A. F. Lindsay, B.A. a divinity student of Queen's, and native of Sydenham, England, who preached an earnest sermon on the sovereignty of Christ, laying stress particularly upon the fact of his realm in his prophesy that "He shall have dominion from sea to sea, and from the river to the ends of the earth." An excellent musical service was rendered by the choir. The solos were by Miss Parley and Mr. Craik. The hymns were "There is a Green Hill Far Away," and Mr. Craig "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere." St. Andrew's has a well-trained choir.

**At St. George's.**

Rev. W. W. Burton preached an interesting sermon, on the second cleansing of the temple, in St. George's cathedral, on Sunday. He is a divinity student of Queen's, and native of Ontario, being shown in our churches, or to things set apart for the service of God.

**A Pleasant Time.**

A new departure was made in Sydenham Street Methodist church, on Sunday night, when the pastor announced that there would be a social gathering in the school room, at the close of the regular service, to which all the congregation, but especially students and strangers were invited. In a few words he explained that the purpose of this gathering was to give the members of the church and strangers an opportunity of getting acquainted with one another, that they might the better prosecute the work of the church.

About one hundred and fifty responded to the invitation, and on entering the school room were warmly greeted by the pastor, many of whom he had not had the opportunity of meeting before. A very pleasant and profitable half hour was spent in social intercourse.

Mr. Manning contended that there are many people in every city, and especially in a university centre like Kingston, who have really no home life. They live in boarding houses, and in their spare time are obliged to spend their money in their rooms which are often cold and cheerless, and the streets. To such persons Sunday is often the most dreary day of the year, and the hour after church on Sunday night the most lonely in the week. How much they appreciate having something out of the ordinary to occupy their attention, during this hour is illustrated by the manner in which the opera house is crowded on Sunday nights, when it is open to the public.

The choir sang several selections in some of which the audience joined. Mr. Cummings, the newly appointed leader, who has a most commanding and pleasing presence, and a fine tenor voice sang the "Glorious Song." Time was allowed between each number for conversation and before the company dispersed. Mr. Manning with a family prayer. This expenditure would be about \$800 and the yearly saving \$200, so that in less than five years the cost of installation would be covered.

Principal Gordon conducted the services, introducing as the speaker of the occasion, Rev. Chancellor Burwash, D.D. of Victoria University, who spoke on the twenty-eighth verse of chapter xxi, St. Matthew's Gospel, "Even as the Son of Man came not to be ministered unto but to minister and to give His life a ransom for many." He said in part: "Studying the life of Jesus Christ you find He deals largely with the individual life and
