GENERAL HOSPITAL

REPORT OF THE VISITING GOVERNORS

They Say That Untruthful Stories Are Being Circulated About the Institution—The Heating System is Too Antiquated.

The monthly meeting of the board of governors, Kingston General Hospital, was held on Monday afternoon at four o'clock. Present: G. Y. Chown, chairman; Rev. Dr. MacGillivray, B. W. Robertson, Felix Shaw, Prof. Marshall, Rev. Dr. Laing, A. F. Chown, Dr. Chown, W. B. Skinner, Dr. Mackie, F. G. Lockhart, R. Uglow, Dr. Duff, T. M. Hoberman, Lieut.-Col. Massie, Archdeacon Carey, Rev. Stearns Tighe, R. J. Carson, C. Livingston.

The visiting governors for last month, Lieut.-Col. Massie and F. G. Lockhart submitted the following report:

"We visited and inspected the hospital on Friday, January 26th. The painters and plumbers who were hard at work in the main building were for the time being causing considerable discomfort, but the work being done was badly needed and when completed will greatly add to the comfort and health of all concerned. Thomas Milo, who has the contract, is doing most excellent work, and in the main halls, is, at his own expense, graining the wood work, while his contract calls for ordinary painting, and in other places is putting on one more coat than the specifications call for. "Dinner was being served and as we had heard stories of enormous waste in this department we made most careful investigation as to the manner of serving, the quality of the food and the disposition made of what was not used. The quality was wholesome and nutritious, and the quantity was generous enough, was not so generous as to incur waste. Those patients which we had the opportunity to observe were partaking of it with evident relish. The stories, like many others, were evidently circulated by those who were not friends of the hospital and so far as we could see are absolutely without foundation."

"In the public wards where many old men and women with some slight chronic ailments such as rheumatism and not confined to bed giving the place more the appearance of a poor house or house of industry than a hospital. They appear just sick enough to give some doctor an excuse to send them there, and they remain on our hands until the same doctor signs for their leaving."

"We also learned that out of twenty-eight cases of diphtheria, all successfully treated, only four have as yet paid anything except the actual cost of their treatment, and the balance of those who pay nothing, we promised that they will pay something."

"It does seem that the time has come when we must insist on some more just and righteous arrangement with the city as to the maintenance of these nursing patients. The view of it the only arrangement which would be satisfactory and we might say just to the hospital, will be one which agrees to a specified rate per day for each and every non-paying patient admitted on the recommendation of one or more medical men duly authorized to do so."

"We were strongly impressed with the difficulties in the way of any economical management in the way of heating. The antiquated character and construction of the main building make one central heating system almost an impossibility. At present we are using ten large furnaces, several boiler engines, a large amount of intelligence and good judgment, and we feel that a man possessing these qualities should, if possible, be procured, the saving in fuel would more than offset the higher wages. In the night wing there was one patient, a child with scarlet fever, yet this wing had to be kept heated and two nurses and a house surgeon attended there, who, from the contagious character of the disease, could not be accommodated in any other part of the institution."

"Hearty commendation is undoubtedly due the ladies for the wisdom and good judgment they are displaying in the expenditure of the money so successfully raised by the Ladies' Auxiliary, and as we governors and all connected with the institution should feel gratified to them for their energy and success in their work and labor of love, so much is being done by them, leaving but little for us to suggest."

"The auditor's report was submitted and a hearty vote of thanks was passed by the board to William Gill and H. M. Rutan for their valuable services. Visiting governors for the month of February are: B. W. Robertson and Prof. Marshall."
