Unionists To Meet About February 15th.

BALFOUR'S CHANCE

TO CROSS INTO THE TARIFF REFORM CAMP.

How the Papers Regard the Chamberlain Circular—Some Think Balfour Will Fall Into Line—Attempt Made to Capture Party Machinery.

London, Feb. 8.—A. J. Balfour finally has acceded to Joseph Chamberlain's wish that a call be made for a general meeting of the unionist party, which is expected will be fixed for February 15th, though no details have yet been settled. In the meantime Mr. Chamberlain has issued an important manifesto which, while accentuating the unionist party division, still leaves Mr. Balfour a bridge over which to cross into the tariff reform camp. Mr. Chamberlain in his letter repudiates the notion that he is a candidate for the leadership of the unionist party, and says: "My own belief is that the great majority of the party, if not all, are perfectly ready to accept Mr. Balfour's general leadership. I think it probable, however, that the majority would welcome a declaration by Mr. Balfour, which would show clearly that tariff reform will not be dropped and which would indicate a definite and unmistakable programme for the future to which they could give hearty support."

Concluding his letter, Mr. Chamberlain says: "The tariff reformers cannot accept a policy of inaction and mystification in regard to the main subject of their political lives."

The Chamberlainite newspaper organs, this morning, apparently assume that Mr. Balfour will cross the bridge for they bear Mr. Chamberlain's letter, "The Crisis Ended," a "United Party," etc., and editorials in the same strain. The suggestion, however, is made by the Chronicle that Mr. Chamberlain has abandoned the frontal attack on Mr. Balfour in favor of an enveloping movement in an attempt to capture the party machinery.

UNDERGROUND RIVER

Located 500 Feet Below the Surface.

St. Catharines, Ont., Feb. 8.—A young lady of Merrittown, returned from a visit to Nelles Corners, Hamilton county, brings the story of the discovery of a big underground river at Nelles Corners.

Last week, while men were drilling for natural gas, they struck the river 500 feet down in the ground. The discovery was made when the drill suddenly dropped down thirty feet. When drawn out it was wet for thirty feet. The rush of the water could be heard away down in the bowels of the earth when the men put their ears to the hole drilled in the ground. The water was pumped out, and with it came some fish. The water tasted like lake water.

The residents around the district believe that it is a great channel connecting the lake with the river. It is believed to explain why all the wells around there ran dry. No one could say which way the river is running.

A Much Traveled Youngster.

New York, Feb. 8.—Kathryn Leonard, Adelia Greenwood Moran, the five-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George E. Moran, of Chicago, started, to-day, with her parents for her home in the west, after having taken in the sights of New York. Notwithstanding her tender age, Miss Moran holds the record for the longest distance over travelled by a child of five years. When she was but eighteen months old she was taken to the summit of Pike's Peak. She has since then travelled almost without interruption. She has crossed the Atlantic and the Pacific oceans several times, has visited every state and territory in this country, except Connecticut, has visited President Roosevelt in the White House, when she was two and one-half years old, called on many governors, has met the pope, and has placed her signature on more hotel registers than any other little girl of her age. And, wherever she went, she took every bit of her long name with her.

A MAN OF THE HOUR.

His Experience and Counsel of Value.

SHORT COFFIN

And Body Of Lad Crushed Into It.

WAS BADLY TREATED

AND BURIED IN HIS WORKING CLOTHES.

Worked in the Snow Barefooted and the Fingers of His Left Hand Had Rotted Off—Farmer Jailed for Horrid Crime.

Buckingham, Que., Feb. 8.—James Kelly, a prosperous farmer, about five miles from here, is in jail on a charge of manslaughter hanging over him as a result of an incident held at Buckingham Junction, on the body of Arnold Walsh, an orphan boy. Kelly got Walsh from the Catholic Emigration Association in July. Since then, it is alleged that Kelly has treated the boy in the most inhuman manner. The boy died on January 22nd, and was buried the next day. Kelly would not allow anyone to see the boy, and this aroused suspicion. An inquest was ordered, and the body had been crushed into the coffin ten inches too short for it and tied with rope to hold the lid on.

Drs. Vial, of Masson, and Belisle of Angers, made a post-mortem examination, and found the boy had been buried in his working clothes. There was a cut over the left eye, which might have caused death, also a cut on the chin. Even after the snow had fallen in the fall the boy had to work without shoes or stockings, and the result was that both his hands and feet were frozen for some time before he died.

The fingers of his left hand had rotted off, and his heels were nearly as bad. Unless a person saw the body, they could not believe that a boy such as an emigrant could work at all.

AN EXCITING TIME.

A Divorce, a Kidnapping Episode and Settlement.

Windsor, Ont., Feb. 8.—Just a year ago, Mrs. Honora Ryan, of Coldwater, Michigan, obtained a divorce from her husband; the custody of the couple's six-year-old girl, was given to Ryan's father. Last fall the former Mrs. Ryan married Andrew Nauchabauer, of Coldwater. Soon afterward Mrs. Nauchabauer kidnapped her child and fled. She was traced to the Pacific coast, and back to Sandwich, Ont., where she and her second husband were living.

A cruel avalanche is reported from Portland. Thousands of poor Canadians are said to have been enticed there by promises of trips to England on cattle ships with little work and good wages, and for the supposed privilege have paid varying sums, only to find themselves stranded in Portland without money to return home, and the high wages they were led to expect existing only in their imagination. The British vice-consul is said to have all the facts now in his possession.

Olive And Salad Oil.

Ottawa, Feb. 8.—The inland revenue department has published a bulletin based upon an analysis that its officials recently made of olive and salad oils exposed for sale in Canada. The terms olive oil and salad oil are synonymous with most people, but the work of the analysis proves that the latter as a rule are cotton seed oil, frequently put up in bottles that resemble the peculiar form long adopted by certain large manufacturers of olive oil and very much alike, in the design of the label. While it is certain that cotton seed oil lacks the peculiar flavor of olive oil, it is probable that so far as food value goes, it may be little inferior to that article.
