QUEEN'S AND M'GILL PLAY THIS EVENING.

Queen's Win, the Championship Comes Here—The McBride-Ellebeck Wrestling Match Takes Place This Evening.

Queen's hockey team to meet McGill here this evening will be the same as played in Toronto last Friday. Dobson is the new man on the wing. The defeat of McGill means that Queen's will get the senior intercollegiate championship. There is every chance of the local team winning as it is in better condition than when McGill defeated it in Montreal three weeks ago by 6 to 5. There will likely be a record crowd at this evening's contest.

McGill—Goal, Mills; point, Harrington or Stevens; cover-point, Ross or Wallace; centre, Chambers; rover, Patrick; left wing, Raphael; right wing, Gilmore.
Queen's—Goal, Mills; point, Macdonnell; cover-point, Sutherland; centre, Crawford; rover, Walsh; left wing, Richardson (Captain); right wing, Dobson.

Lou Burns, of Varsity, will referee. The Montreal Witness says: "If McGill wins, the trophy will be practically here, since her final game with Toronto will be played in Montreal on McGill ice. But the team must put up a better game than that of last week, if they are to beat Queen's on her own ice. The forwards must play clean, hard combination, and not trust to heart-breaking individual rushes, which are useless as far as scoring goes. McGill has material to play Queen's to a standstill; if they will but work together and feed the puck to the men who are working in centre ice.

Lord Stanley, it is said, will be made a steward of the English Jockey Club, to succeed the late Sir James Miller. Lord Stanley comes from an old racing family. He is the youngest member of the Jockey Club, and breeds and races horses quite extensively.

The amounting of Lou Dillon, 128, the world's champion trotter, will be bred this spring to John A. McKeeron, 2,091, has been favorably received by horsemen. It will be remembered that Nancy Hanks, 2,041, the former, trotting queen, has also been bred to 3444 A. McKeeron.

For faraway New Zealand there is on his way to England the horse Nociolum, for whom James Buchanan, a noted English turfman, paid \$25,000 in order to race him in the Ascot gold-cup and other weight-for-age races in Great Britain. The Ascot meeting will this year be strongly international, there being entries from New Zealand, India, Austria and France, besides Ireland and England.

In the United States intercollegiate hockey tournament Yale and Harvard are still tied for first place. Two games are to be played this week. Harvard and Brown will meet at Cambridge next Saturday night, and at the same time Yale and Princeton will meet in the St. Nicholas rink, New York. The last and deciding game will be played in the St. Nicholas rink on Saturday, February 17th, between Yale and Harvard.

LORD HIGH ADMIRAL SAID TO BE IN NEW YORK IN PETTICOATS.

A Writer Claims the Marchioness's Education Was American—An Amusing Story Connected There.

Among the foreigners of distinction who have recently arrived in America are now staying in New York is a British lord high admiral, who is still in pinafores and petticoats, being a little over two years of age.

It is hardly necessary to say that his naval rank is not due to any seniority and that he has seen no service, his office of lord admiral coming to him by inheritance. The diminutive flag officer is the youngest son of the marquis of Donegal, who has arrived here with his mother, who, although a daughter of Henry S. Twining, of Halifax, is an American by education, having received her schooling at the Quincy Mansion just outside of Boston, and afterward at Wellesley College. She married the late Lord Donegal, as his third wife on December 23rd, 1902, he being eighty years of age and she twenty, and the following October she gave birth to the boy, who in 1904, succeeded to the many peerages and dignities of the old marquis.

These dignities include that of hereditary lord high admiral of Lough Neagh, which is the largest lake, not merely in Ireland, but also in the United Kingdom, covering an area of 153 square miles, and with a coast line of sixty-five miles. The little dandy back to the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries, when the lake was the scene of many important naval battles, the last one fought on its waters occurring in 1642. Recently a scheme has been under way for the draining of the lake, with the object of retaining the land which it covers available for agricultural purposes. As its depth averages thirty to forty feet, and as it is about seventy feet above sea level, the matter depending on the River Shannon would suffice to drain the lake, the disappearance of which would also tend to dispose of the popular legend as to the existence of an ancient city, buried beneath its waters, of which the poet Thomas Moore, wrote as follows:

On Lough Neagh's banks as the fisherman strays
When the clear, cold eye's declining,
He sees the tower towers of other days
In the wave beneath him shining.
Formerly the estates of the marquis of Donegal who are entitled to wear at court and on state occasions the uniform of a lord high admiral, were of immense value, comprising nearly all the land around Lough Neagh, as well as the greater part of the city of Belfast. Most of the property was, however, alienated by the third marquis of Donegal, whose sons predeceased him, and who thereupon left everything that he could to his daughter, married to the eighth Earl of Shaftesbury, and there has been some talk in recent years of an attempt to recover possession of these estates. The present marquis' landed possessions are limited to the island of Magee in County Antrim, which he owns, and his mother has some property of her own.

I note, by the by, that the Peerage of Burke and Debrett refer to the late marquis as having been only twice married. This is a mistake. He was married three times. The dissolution of the first marriage, of which no mention is made, furnished one of the "bones of contention" of the early sixties, the evidence going to show that the respondent had been previously married to a William Mure, her union to whom had been pronounced by the courts null and void on grounds identical with those upon which the marquis based his extraordinary petition. The second wife of the marquis was a Miss Mary Cobb, and an equally impossible personage. She was frequently jailed for disorderly conduct, and disturbance, endeavored to poison her husband with a hakelet, and died in a workhouse.
