TO HAVE TEST CASE

In Regard to Touring American Vessels. Detroit, Mich., Feb. 10.-A Washington dispatch says a friendly suit to settle a doubtful point of law regarding the towing of American vessels in home waters, by a foreign tug, will be shortly filed in Michigan by the United States attorney for the eastern district of that state, as the result of a request to the department of justice by the department of commerce and labor, the case in point being the Canadian tug Florence, whose master was charged, at Port Huron, with operating in American waters without a license, thereby subjecting himself to a fine. The law is specific in its prohibition against the towing of American vessels in home waters, except when a part of the trip is made in foreign waters. The master of the Florence claims that in passing from Lake St. Clair to Lake Huron, and in foreign (Canadian) waters, while in the channel opposite Amherstburg, the department of commerce maintains the exception is only in the case of foreign tugs towing from a foreign to a United States port or vice versa.

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OUR SMALL IGNORANCES.

Some Things That May Prove Reflections on Our Cultures.

A great deal of the charm of polite conversation consists in what is said but in what is implied-not in expressions, but in allusions. A light reference to some classical story-a quiet glance at some page of history-half-life from some loved poet-gives not only grace to the remarks of the speaker, but sets to the attention of his audience. Seldom does a verse or a couplet fail to "bring down" the British House of Commons; reporters seldom omit to write ("hear") after a line from Horace, Virgil, Shakespeare, or Milton. And the listener who says to himself, "Ah! the 'Georgics,' 'Hamlet,' or 'L'Allegro,' feels himself to be as cultured a person as he who has uttered the quotation.

We resent the impertinence of foot-note and even of inverted comma when an allusion is made in print, and we understand it; such helps to memory or to knowledge are reflections on our culture; and yet when we see that the majority of ourselves, we are shocked to find how ignorant we are concerning allusions.
