It has 1,170 square feet on the corner Broadway and Wall street, which was recently sold for \$7,000,000. It had on it a four-storey stone building. The rent was \$25,000 a year, plus \$8, 000 taxes, making \$33,000. The price realized was \$589 a square foot, or \$1.15 a square inch, or \$26,051,112 an acre.
