BOYD IS SET FREE RELEASED AFTER SERVING MANY MONTHS.

Toronto, Feb. 13.—T. C. Robinson, K.C., today, received notice from R. W. Scott, secretary of state, that the request for the release of William Boyd, of Chatham, had been granted.

Boyd, in May, 1905, was sentenced to one year in Central Prison for conspiracy, in a fake foot race at St. Louis, to defraud A.M. Douglas, of Chatham, out of \$10,000. A strong petition was signed by leading citizens of Chatham and Kent county.

The executors of the J. J. Long estate, and Harry Lindsay, an executor of the estate of the late Charles Cameron, Collingwood, and J. K. McLaughlan, have issued a writ to compel Capt. Peter Campbell, Collingwood, to consent to the sale of the Northern Navigation company.

The Very Latest Called From All Over The World. John D. Rockefeller is on a cruise to South America.

The Toronto Railway company is building cars for Winnipeg. The local option by-law carried in Somers, by only six votes.

King Alfonso had an abscess removed from his shoulder to-day. The Allan Line steamer from Liverpool, docked at St. John, on the 12th.

A massacre of Jews is reported to have taken place at Kalarashi, Bessarabia. The Hamilton city council refused to vote for a reduction of liquor licenses.

Lady Laurier will accompany Sir Wilfrid on his forthcoming visit to Toronto. Rev. R. B. Nevill will be appointed rector of St. Barnabas' church, St. Catharines.

Parents at Toronto Junction are alarmed at an outbreak of ictch at Carleton school. The property at the corner of Queen and Bond streets, Toronto, has been sold for \$30,000.

The Austrian-Hungarian government has sent a fully equipped battery of mountain guns as a gift to Emperor Smith's of Abyssinia.

It is said the address in reply to the speech from the throne in the legislature will be moved by Hugh Clark and seconded by P. H. Bowyer.

The repeal of the act of last year which created the state commission of Smith's is proposed in a bill in the New York legislature.

The Interstate commerce commission will investigate the charge of discrimination and combination in restraint of trade made against the railroads.

Doctor William Brooks, director of the observatory, Geneva, N.Y., states that his comet is now within one degree of the North Celestial Pole.

Eddie Schnare, the only son of Esrom Schnare, and Charlie Kaunack, N.S., left their homes, Sunday afternoon, to skate on Schnare's lake and were drowned.

The new labor party members of parliament to the number of thirty, who were nominated under the auspices of the labor representation committee, held their first meeting in a committee room headed by J. Keir Hardie chairman for the coming session.

KING LEOPOLD IS ACCUSED.

Monarch Has Been Grafting in Congo State. Brussels, Feb. 13.—Prof. Felicien Cattier is out with a pamphlet declaring that King Leopold has realized from crown domains in Congo Free State in ten years \$15,000,000 in profits on India rubber alone, which he asserts, have been diverted to the king's private use.

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TO BE ANTI-JEWISH NEW POLICY OF THE RUSSIAN GOVERNMENT.

Will Be Allowed to Live in St. Petersburg Only Six Months in the Year—What is Said Roosevelt Will Do.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 13.—It is reported, to-day, that the Russian government has decided to adopt a strong anti-Jewish policy. Hereafter all Jews, even the richest merchants being included, will be allowed to live in St. Petersburg only six months in every year. The wives, children and other members of their families will be expelled immediately.

The Novorossiya, in a bitter article on America, printed, to-day, says President Roosevelt intends to seize the islands of north-eastern Siberia to hoist the American flag in Russian waters, taking advantage of the weakness of Russia following the war with Japan.

Eight hundred revolutionists were sent to Siberia yesterday. This is the first batch of a great group of the most dangerous insurgents numbering about three five thousand persons which the government has decided to send into exile.

A HOWE ISLANDER Is a Candidate For County Sheriff.

Hammond, Indiana, Tribune. Lawrence Cox, Hammond's leading police officer, in another column of this issue, announces his candidacy for the republican nomination for county sheriff. Mr. Cox has been up and down the county from one end to the other, canvassing the individuals of the other candidates who are opposing him and feeling highly gratified at the prospect before him. He is sure of success at both the primaries and convention, and being the first man in the field he has been unflinching in his pursuit of criminals, who have invaded this corner of Indiana. His reputation abroad, in Chicago, and as a member of the National Police Chief's Association, gives him precedence in his line of work, and he has made a good police chief while he has held the office in Hammond. Both he and his friends feel that he is entitled to recognition from the republican party for his zealous services if the prosecution of a diligent and untiring canvass means anything, Mr. Cox says he is going to win the nomination.

Mr. Cox is a son of John Cox, of Howe Island.

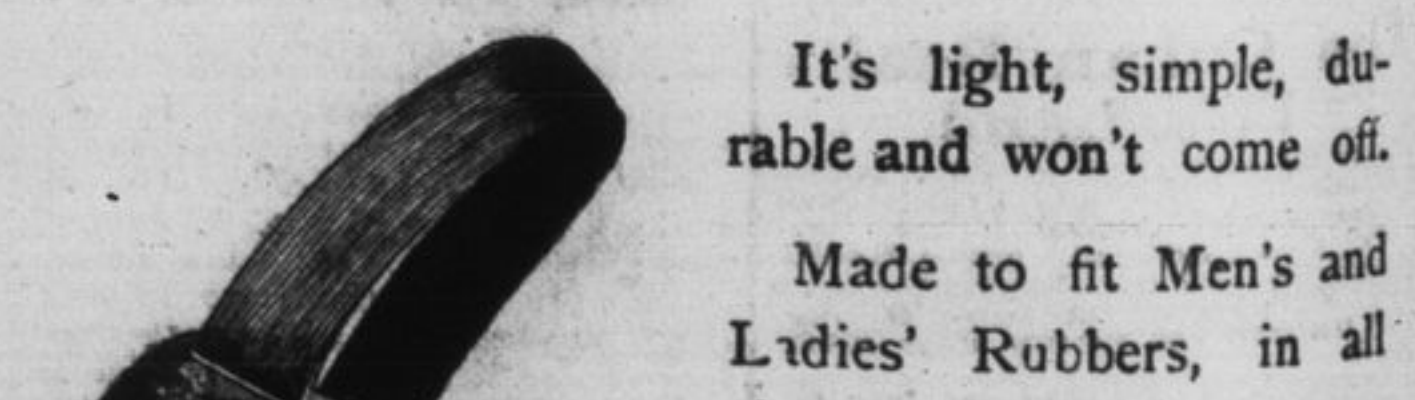
