THE LIGHT PLANT AFFAIRS.

The Plant Cannot Yield Big Profits Till Extended-He Favors Reducing Electricity for House Lighting to Ten Cents. In discussing the light, heat and

power plant affairs, Alderman Toye, chairman of the committee, and, who has had a closer connection with the plant than any other alderman, stated that there was a wrong impression concerning Mr. Campbell. Although the latter had been appointed merely as expert, he had in reality been acting as general manager from the time the city took over the plant, and had given as much time to the duties as any general manager would. Through the inaction of last year's committee in regard to extensions, which Mr. Compbell advised as essential, if the plant was to be made a satisfactory paying concern, he had been greatly handicapped, by being required to give a good service and to make profits on a plant that was not up to date, and which consisted to a certain extent of second hand machinery. Ald. make big profits or give the service expected of it until large extensions are made. As to the financial management, which has been referred to, he says it is on the same basis as that of the waterworks, controlled by the

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
