DESPERATE STRUGGLE. Going on Between Various Sections. St. Petersburg, Feb. 17.—Information is given that the desperate struggle which has been raging in the government between the reactionary and the progressive forces, is approaching a culmination and must end within a few days in the resignation of the Minister of Interior Durnovo, who is leading the movement for thoroughgoing repression, or of Premier Witte and several of the members of the cabinet.

NOT BELIEVED. Pekin, Feb. 17.—A rumor of a plot for a mass killing of foreigners, on February 24th, is totally discredited here. United States Minister Rockhill says that he has heard nothing to indicate that there is any foundation for such a rumor.

BANK CLERK MISSING. The Authorities Say the Loss Will Be Small. St. John, N.B., Feb. 17.—There is a mild sensation in banking circles as a clerk named A. Roberts, of the Bank of British North America, is reported missing, and the bank authorities admit a small loss by his departure, but say it is not at all serious.

Get After Bogus Baronets. London, Feb. 17.—Next week a committee appointed by the home secretary and headed by the earl of Pembroke will take up the complaints that some fifty or sixty "so-called baronets" in the United Kingdom are holding their titles without legal right. These are not swindlers who adopt titles to "do" credulous people out of their cash, but men who have used the titles for years.

IN A WEEK'S TIME. The Work of Formulating Details Proceeds. AN UNBLOODY WAR. Has Broken Out Between Austria and Servia. Vienna, Feb. 17.—By a decree of the government of Austria-Hungary, the importation of cattle into Austria-Hungary, has been prohibited by Servian merchants who have cancelled all orders placed with Austrian firms.

On January 31st, several coast villages in the department of Cauca were destroyed and more than fifty persons were killed or drowned.
