### Patriarchs Militant.

#### Visit of General Raney to Local Canton.

Meeting of the Sovereign Grand Lodge in Toronto—Over Thirty Thousand Visitors Expected—The Special Attractions to Kingstonians—Trip to This City and The Thousand Islands.

Gen. Raney, the head of the Patriarchs Militant, I.O.O.F., (the organization which will take place in connection with the meeting of the Sovereign Grand Lodge of Odd-fellows in September) arrived in Kingston on Friday, February 15th, and met Kingstons in the lodge room. The general gave a glowing account of the prospects of the great entertainment which will take place in connection with the meeting of the Sovereign Grand Lodge of Odd-fellows in September. The supreme lodge of the order, the highest legislative body, is comparatively small, numbering no more than one hundred and twenty-five, but including some of the ablest men in America, and coming from all parts of the United States and Canada. The present grand sire is R. A. Wright, the eminent lawyer and banker, of Allentown, Pa. One of its past grand sires is Dr. C. L. T. Campbell, ex-mayor of London, and the Sovereign Grand Lodge has not met in any city since he held office many years ago.

Gen. Raney—who is grand company, because of his pleasant conversation—says that the Sovereign Grand Lodge draws to it every year, where over a million, between 30,000 and 35,000 odd-fellows, from all over the world, that in Toronto in September, and about 3,000 uniformed men. He knows for a fact that many visitors from the United States to Toronto will desire to pass down the river, stopping incidentally at Kingston and inspecting its historic points. The canton will be giving all useful information about the places to be visited, and these are distributed among the visitors at their common rendezvous, which is the place where the lodge and canton meet.

There will be a commercial club, or any organization having the good of the city at heart. "The city needs a large hotel," said General Raney at the meeting last evening. "Who knows but among the visitors in September will be the man or men who have the capital ready to be invested to invest some of it here? The remark was suggestive and it will be remembered.

### WON BY PORT HOPE

#### ST. GEORGE'S LOST BY TWO TO NOTHING.

Port Hope Wins the Round—St. George's a Lighter Team—The Locals Were Weak at Shooting.

Port Hope defeated St. George's at the Kingston rink last evening in a junior O.H.A. match by two goals to nothing, and won the round by five to two. Having played a number of games three to two score on the latter's ice, last Tuesday, it was supposed that St. George's would at least win at home, especially when Mrs. Fay declared that they were to win the O.H.A. championship. This is one of the times when there must have been a law in Mrs. Fay's vision microscope. Port Hope are a slightly better team than St. George's. They are heavier and play together better. Their shooting was also sharper. St. George's while every whit as fast and as good stick handlers, were decidedly weak in shooting. They had a number of chances to score, but either missed them by poor judgment or shot with little or no force.

Neither team would make much of a showing against the Kingston Frontenac-Beechgrove juniors of two and three years ago. The latter were faster and played with more speed.

The checking by both teams was very sharp throughout. St. George's had the better of the argument in this regard in the second half, and played well down towards the Port Hope goal, but with their lack of shooting ability and the alertness of the visitors' point and cover-point, nothing was gained.

For Port Hope, the defence played a good game, and on the forward line it would be hard to individualize. For St. George's, Murphy and Gravelle did the most effective work. Their play was of the brilliant order. St. George's are younger than the Port Hope seven, and this is their first year in the O.H.A., so that the showing they made was very good. With more careful coaching they would have won.

It was nip and tuck, though perhaps Port Hope had slightly the better of the play. One goal was scored in this half, Murphy finding the St. George's net on a good shot from the side. St. George's defence was playing out of position, or the shot would have been blocked.

St. George's had the better of the play in the second half, but Port Hope played a very strong defence game. A number of times it looked as though St. George's would score, but nothing resulted. For fifteen minutes near the close of the match, St. George's outskated and outplayed their opponents, but their work was ineffective. When but five seconds remained, A. Hemmick shot from about ten feet in front of St. George's goal, the puck struck the hand of Goal-keeper Chown, who tried to throw it out, but the rubber fell on the ice just over the line. The goal judge did not raise his flag, but the referee being close at hand decided to count the goal.

Though the contest was strenuous, no one was injured. A number were ruled off both sides for tripping, but force Burns being strict in regard to rough play, but happily there was little of this.

Port Hope had a following of fully a hundred supporters, who came down on the evening local train.
